An Increase in 4-H Club Enrollment.
1932 4-H Club enrollments for Holt county show an increase of ten per cent over last year. Thirty-five Clubs have an enrollment of 352 members. Last year thirty-two Clubs had 321 members enrolled.

Clothing Clubs head the list with fourteen Clubs and 135 girls enrolled. Three Baby Beef Clubs have thirty-eight members; four rope Clubs have a membership of thirty-six; three Poultry Clubs have thirty-four members; nineteen members are enrolled in two Garden Clubs and twelve boys are enrolled in two Pig Clubs. Two Girls Room Improvement Clubs have a membership of eighteen; twenty-eight girls are enrolled in three cooking Clubs and two canning Clubs have an enrollment of twenty-seven girls.

Hay Crop Looks Short.
Prospects for a good hay crop in Holt county this year do not look very bright. A large number of farmers in the county are planting other crops to furnish forage.

Cane and sudan grass will comprise the greater part of the acreage being planted for feed. Other crops include millet and kafir corn. Sudan grass cane and millet seed are cheaper this year than they have been for some time. These crops will supply a large amount of feed for a small cost with ordinary amounts of moisture.

Grasshopper Meetings.

Holt county farmers have been notifying County Agent Rooney the past week of the hatching of numerous grasshoppers in various localities. Mr. Rooney has verified reports by going into the country and inspecting fields. In one instance he picked up a handful of soil containing hopper eggs and watched them hatch in his hand.

Immediate action, with no time to lose, is urged by the agent. Go after them with poisoned bran or sawdust for breakfast and catch all you can with "hopperdozers," is his advice, which is corroborated by the best minds of the state and national departments of agriculture. Poisoned sawdust is recommended as an efficient substitute where bran cannot be secured or afforded.

A series of farmers meetings over the county will be conducted by Mr. Rooney to give them full information as to the best methods of procedure and to show them models of hopperdozers (for catching the insects on a large scale) which can be built at low cost by the farmers of a community.

When a dozer is used the insects may be sacked and fed to hogs and chickens. There are two types of hopperdozers, one using water and kerosene and the other being a dry type. Both are carried on sled runners and cover a swath from sixteen

to twenty feet wide.

The meetings for the following week are: Monday, May 30th, district number 160 north of Emmet; Tuesday, May 31st, Atkinson, Memorial Hall; Wednesday, June 1st, Stuart town hall; Thursday, June 2nd, district 171 northeast of O'Neill and on Friday, June 3rd, district 55, northeast of Page. All meetings begin at 8:30 p. m.

Mr. Rooney points out that federal assistance cannot be depended upon, and that if it comes it may be too late, as Congress has refused to vote upon the federal grasshopper appropriation bill which has been proposed.
