IN DISTRICT COURT

Rose Ann Barrett has filed a petition in the district court asking for a decree of divorce from Patrick Barrett. In her petition she alleges that they were married at Atkinson on July 7, 1919, and that ever since that date she has conducted herself as a chaste and loving wife. As a result of this union three children were born: Veronica, aged 9, Ann, aged 7 and George Barrett, aged 3. She alleges that he has been guilty of extreme cruelty at various times and without just cause of provocation has called her vile and vulgar names. That he is addicted to the use of alcoholic liquors and when under its influence has gone to the home of the plaintiff, threatened and abused her. She asks for a restraining order to keep defendant from molesting her, or attempting to talk to her, or coming to her home or in any manner interfering with her. She asks for an absolute divorce and custody of the children and that he be required to pay a reasonable sum for her maintenance and support of the children, during the pendency of this action, suit money and reasonable alimony and such other relief as may be just and equitable.
