Plotting Against the Republic.

It seems incredible that American citizens should be so lacking in patriotism as to undertake deliberately to stir up trouble for their country and so lacking in humanity that they should be willing to increase unemployment, to hinder business recovery and to impoverish multitudes of their fellow citizens.

And yet that is precisely the attltude of the militant Reds of the country. The state police of Michigan have unearthed what is described as a "bold scheme to wreck the financial structure of major cities" by circulaing false rumors concerning the stability of the biggest banks in those cities, seeking to start runs against them and bring about their failure, with the avowed purpose of creating "unrest that would lead to revolution." There is little doubt that some of the runs that have endangered big banks, notably in Chicago, have been started by these criminal radicals and unpatriotic agitators.

Doubtless this attack upon the banks is merely a part of the Red program designed to protract the depression in the wicked hope that conditions may become so bad as to lead to riot and revolt. Another part of that program was worked out a few months ago when "hunger marches" were organized to send large groups of unemployed men to Washington to demand relief from the Federal Government. 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
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
