To the Voters of the Fifteenth
Judicial District:

My attention has just been called to a political circular, dated October 15th and printed at Ainsworth and being circulated by George Bressler of this city, purporting to have been prepared by the members of the Depositors' Committee of the Nebraska State Bank, wherein a certain lawsuit filed in the District Court of Holt county, Nebraska, against me some two years ago, involving a certain note held by the failed Nebraska State Bank is referred to.

It is charged that I, as District Judge, have prevented a trial of the case by failing to call in an outside Judge and this is assigned as a reason why I should not be reelected. I feel sure that these gentlemen or any of my fellow citizens do not wish to deny to me the right to a day in Court in defense of that suit according to the rules of orderly procedure. To try this case by circular and newspaper publicity would be highly improper

and prejudicial not only to myself but to the plaintiff and all persons interested therein.

That the case has not been heretofore tried has not been due to any fault or effort on my part. If the fact that the case has been pending for two years indicates anything it would seem to indicate the weakness of the case against me and the strength of my defense. Before this suit was brought, I filed a petition in the Receivership case setting forth a complete defense to this note and asking its cancellation and surrender. To this petition no answer has ever been filed.

There has been nothing concealed about the facts in this case. I have from time to time disclosed all of the facts pertaining to my defense to representatives of this failed bank and the Banking Department in Lincoln. I have likewise disclosed to this Depositors' Committee the facts constituting my defense. The fact that I am the District Judge does not deprive me, as a citizen, of a fair and full hearing. As District Judge, however, I am wholly disqualified to make an order effecting this lawsuit. The Bank or any person clothed with lawful authority representing it has never requested that the case be set for trial nor that an outside Judge be called in by me for the purpose of presiding at the trial. Since this lawsuit was filed I have called in, on different occasions, three different outside District Judges to preside who have held Court in this County and no request was made to any of such Judges, so presiding, to have this case set for trial.

The Constitution authorizes the Supreme Court to take complete control of all District Courts in the matter of the arrangement of presiding Judges. No request has ever been made to the Supreme Court for any such action. Personally, I have no control over the Plaintiff's case any more than any other defendant. I am ready for trial. In all probability there would have been a more speedy trial of this case had it not been for the fact that there have been changes in the Banking Department, and on different occasions when the legal representatives of the Bank consulted me about the case and when I disclosed the facts constituting my defense they, in every instance, indicated their desire for further time to investigate and check up the statements of fact as disclosed by me.

My position in this law suit is no different than that of any other man

who is sued in Court. I am ready with my defense if and when the suit is pressed. While as stated, it is not necessary that I should request an outside Judge to try this case, I have no objection to doing so if and when the legal representatives of the Bank or Banking Department so request. My position in this law suit is that of an ordinary litigant. It is my own personal private business. I, insofar as this case is concerned, am shorn of all my judicial power and authority. It has nothing whatever to do with my duties as District Judge. I have from the first and at all times since, denied any liability on this note. This circular and the effort that is now being made is an attempt to compel me to pay something that I do not owe and to deprive me of the right to defend myself because I am District Judge.

I appeal to the voters of this District to see that I be accorded the privileges of an ordinary citizen and that they be not influenced and prejudiced by the underlying motives of this circular.

nuts should be chosen and planted with the hulls on. In ordinary soil it is best to plant the nuts two in a place and about four inches deep in cultivated or well spaded ground, if

possible the nuts should be planted where the trees are to grow permanently and the planting should therefore be about 20 feet apart each way. Waste land, low land, and road sides may be planted to black walnuts and made to yield a profitable return in nuts and lumber in the future. While the nuts may not have much market value, they are much sought after by many Nebraska people. Walnut logs often being a high price, the trees will add to the value of the farm even though they are never cut for lumber.

Large Increase in 4-H Entries At Ak-Sar-Ben

Nebraska 4-H club boys and girls will exhibit 630 head of livestock in the Ak-Sar-Ben Live Stock Show October 29th to November 4th, according to the entries. Forty-one counties will be represented from Nebraska, twenty-one from Iowa, three from Kansas, and one from Missouri. Of the 630 Nebraska entries, 470 are cattle, 130 are swine, and thirty are sheep. Iowa ranks second with 214 cattle, ninety swine, and four sheep, making a total of 298. Twenty-two steers are entered from Kansas, while Missouri has entered one in this class. Those in charge of the show are gratified at the fifty per cent increase over 1931 when 484 cattle, 141 swine and twenty-three sheep were shown in the 4-H club class. Many additional counties are showing at the Ak-Sar-Ben that did not show at the State Fair.

Nebraska Tax Primer Being Printed

Farmers, teachers, newspapers, and business men are already writing to the Agricultural College for copies of the Nebraska tax primer. The primer is made up of twelve chapters, each printed as a separate pamphlet. Chapters one and two are being printed at the present time and chapters three and four are practically read for print. The primer includes lessons about expenditures, public revenues, federal and state revenue systems, intangible property tax, exemptions, general property tax, sales tax, income tax, taxation of corporations, the franchise tax and the tax administration, and the relative burden of taxes.

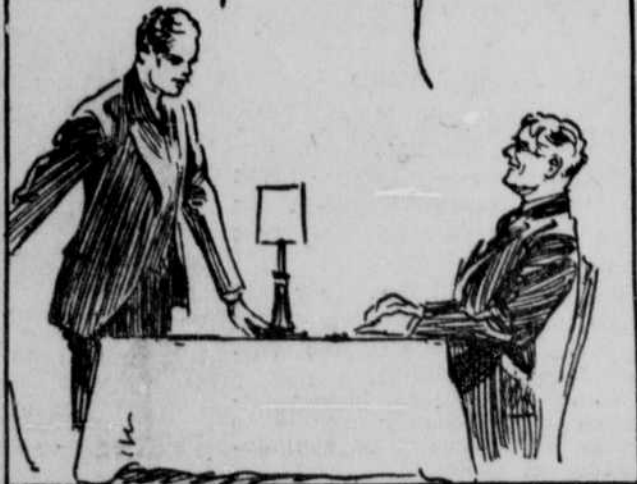

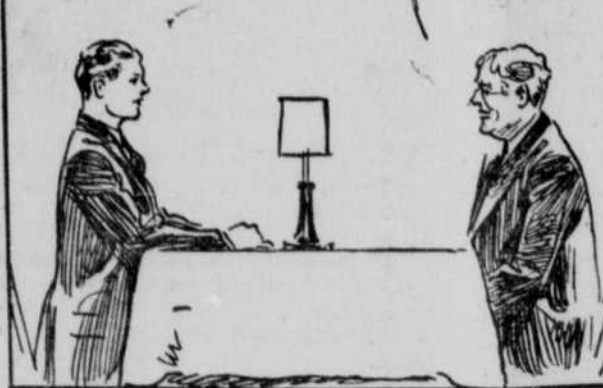

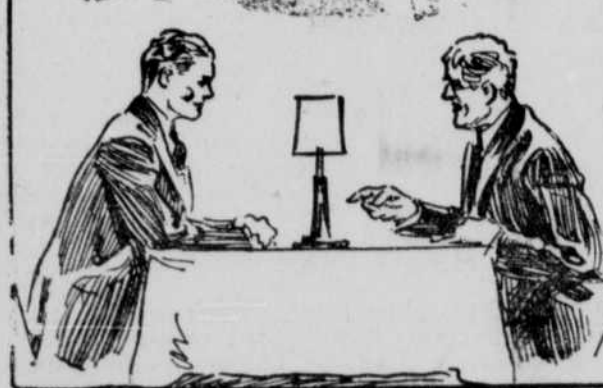
