Farm Bureau, and, Whereas, thhere was filed in the office of the County Clerk on the 16th day of September ,1932, a remonstrance petition against the further allowance of said budget, which remonstrance petition contains 828 legal signers, being more than one-eighth more names than the original petition.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the County Clerk of Holt county, Nebraska, be and he hereby is ordered and directed to submit the question to a vote of the people of the County at the General Election held therein in the vear 1932.
