No Nullification

State Journal: Any attempt made by the wet forces in Nebraska to secure at the hands of the legislature at its forthcoming session a repeal of the state prohibition enforcement law must be regarded as a deliberate effort at nullification.

Drys will insist that this is not the proper and orderly method in which to undo what has been done. They were held to an orderly and lawful procedure in order to secure what they gained, and certainly there is no such haste necessary to secure the return of legal sale of intoxicants as would

justify such a short cut and such a disregard of the popular will as last expressed directly upon the subject

That orderly way would be first to submit the question of eliminating the amendment in the form the constitution prescribes. Then if the people desired it stricken from the fundamental law, the repeal of the enforcement law would automatically follow.

Outside of a few communities in Nebraska the law has been enforced as well as most other restrictions upon the freedom of the individual which abound in the laws of the state.

WHY LAKES DRY UP.

That scores of north Nebraska lakes are drying up from a cause not even suspected here is advanced by Gail Billings, now of Illinois, who says he once ranched here, and who passed through here recently, according to an Amelia special to the Norfolk Daily News.

"Long ago we noticed that sandhill lakes were permanent only when left to themselves. Wind shifted waters packed the small amount of silt in these lakes and made a water tight bottom. Let cattle, horses and men do much wading in these lakes and their feet make holes in this silt and away goes your water through sand or gravel.

"This was noticed in early day dry weather. In wet weather live stock finds feed anywhere but in dry weather the most desirable green feed is found on the margins of lakes and consequently more wading is done then.

"In dry times, the remaining lakes are fished 'harder' and more wading is done, induced by shallow waters. This angle of the question is well worth investigation by you north Nebraskans," Billings advised.

THE G. O. P. FUTURE.

The immediate future of the Republican party was well summoned up on the night after election by Everett Sanders, the party's national chairman, when he said:

"What of the republican party? It will become the minority party. It repudiates none of its policies, abandons none of its principles. It apologizes for no part of the matchless record of the Hoover administration or the traditions and record of the party throughout its 75 years of existence.

That the republican party as a temporary minority party will aid the majority in constructive measures can be judged by its record in the past. In the Wilson administration it gave heroic and needed help on critical occasions during the World War. It fought an obstructive battle only when

an effort was made to overthrow time honored American principles and place us in European political entanglements and subsequent history has proved that both in its support of the administration, and in its obstruction to European entanglements it fought wisely and well.
