The Old Days of Barter are Here

Over in Iowa the art of bartering is getting to be the order of the day. In that state you can rent a cow for \$1.25 per week, provided you feed her; you can trade wood for groceries; with a load of corn you can buy coal or lumber. An with three cents and a piece of scrip money you can purchase a dollars worth of merchandise.

Two municipalities have embarked upon a scrip money experiment. The Hawarden city council started with an issue of 300 trade coupons, worth \$1.00 each, to pay workers upon a paving project. In using the coupons a three cent stamp purchased from the city clerk must be attached for each transaction. When thirty-six stamps have been pasted the city redeems the coupons for \$1.00 each, realizing \$1.08 per coupon, \$1 for redeeming the paper and eight cents for printing.

Creston's fire department owns a self supporting kitchen. The hungry earn their food at the wood pile, and farmers and bakers donate the food. Three college youth do the cooking for board and room at the fire station. An elevator company at Lawler will give one thousand pounds of coal for one wagon load of corn. In Page county, farmers are dickering with four Louisiana lumber companies. Lumber is cheap in the south, and grains are comparatively high. The Iowa farmers want to trade part of their corn crop for lumber needed on the farms.

That the defendant has left their home five or six times a year and has stayed away for a long period of time, during the past few years, and has failed to provide any support for the plaintiff.

That in April, 1932, the defendant left their home, without cause, and has never returned.

The old Line Life Insurance Company has filed suit in the district court against Donald M. Cunningham to foreclose a mortgage on the northwest quarter of section 22, and the west half of the northeast quarter of section 22 and the southwest quarter of section 15, all in township 29, north of range 9, west of the Sixth P. M. The petition alleges that on June 4, 1926, Ida M. Cunningham, widow, gave her note to the plaintiff in the sum of \$7,000.00 and gave a mortgage on the above land as security. That thereafter the title to said property was conveyed to Donald M. Cunningham who, on June 4, 1931, to further secure the payment, executed and delivered to plaintiff his promissory notes aggregating \$7,000, with interest coupons attached. That four of said notes were for the sum of \$200 each, payable on the 4th day of each June for the next four years and one for \$6,200 payable on June 4, 1936. They allege that defendant has failed to pay the interest coupon due on December 4, 1931, amounting to \$210 and also failed to pay the ones due on June 4th and December 4, 1932. That he also failed to pay the taxes on the property for the year 1930, amounting to \$114.65, or the taxes for the year 1931 amounting to \$108.32. They ask that the mortgage be foreclosed and the land sold.
