

TRICKS of MAGIC . O CONTROL OF LINGHOUST

HOW TO HYPNOTIZE A CARD AND MAKE IT MOVE **ACROSS A TABLE**




Prepare for this trick by attaching one end of a piece of black silk thread to the back of a playing card with a small piece of wax, and the other end to a button of your vest. Lay the card on a table with several others scattered around it, and bring the thread over the edge and under the table on the side opposite to which you stand. When you are ready for the trick tell the spectators that you will hypnotize the cards and make one of them move across the table and away from you. As you make passes over the table slowly walk backward, and the thread, which is invisible and attached to your vest, will pull the card in the other direction from which you are mov-

FORETELLING THE ENDING NUMBERS IN A DOMINO GAME




Suggest that two persons play a game of dominos, and inform them that you will predict the ending numbers of the game. Mix up the dominos and secretly take out one-any but one with identical numbers will do. The game is played in the regular manner, each domino is matched until none are left, and the numbers appearing at either end will be the same as those appearing on the domino which you have removed. In the above drawing, a five and three have been taken out, and you will notice that these numbers appear on either end in the row that has been matched.

HOW TO MAKE A DIME DISAPPEAR FROM HAND




Prepare for this trick by placing a little wax or other adhesive substance on the nail of the middle finger of your right hand. SOME CAPERS WITH MYSTERIOUS NUMBER 142,857



Take this number 142,857, multiply it by 2, and the answer is 285,714. Notice that the same figures appear in the answer as are in the original number, only they are rearranged. Add the figures in the answer, and the total is 27. Divide this by 3, and you get 9. Then multiply 142,857 by these successive figures, 3, 4, 5 and 6, and in each instance the same figures appear in the answer as are in the original number. Add the figures of each answer and the totals will be the same-27. Now multiply 142,857 by 7, and the answer will be 999,999. Note in the upper left corner of the above drawing how the six figures of this number 142,857 are divided in three sets by the arrows. By adding the two figures in each set you get 9.
