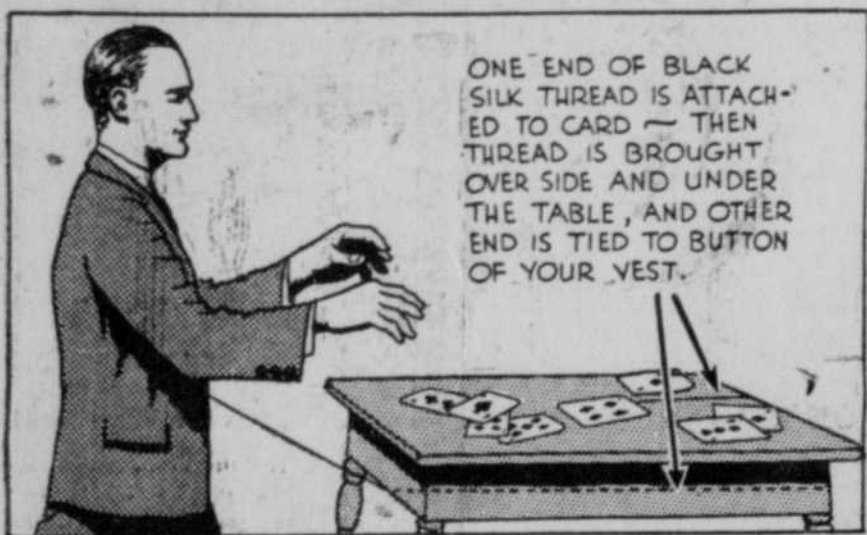

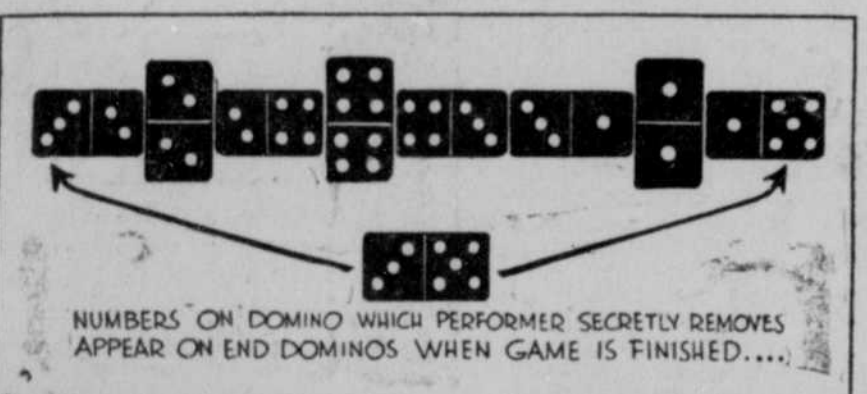
HOW TO HYPNOTIZE A CARD AND MAKE IT MOVE ACROSS A TABLE



ONE END OF BLACK SILK THREAD IS ATTACHED TO CARD - THEN THREAD IS BROUGHT OVER SIDE AND UNDER THE TABLE, AND OTHER END IS TIED TO BUTTON OF YOUR VEST.

Prepare for this trick by attaching one end of a piece of black silk thread to the back of a playing card with a small piece of wax, and the other end to a button of your vest.

Suggest that two persons play a game of dominos, and inform them that you will predict the ending numbers of the game.

HOW TO MAKE A DIME DISAPPEAR FROM HAND



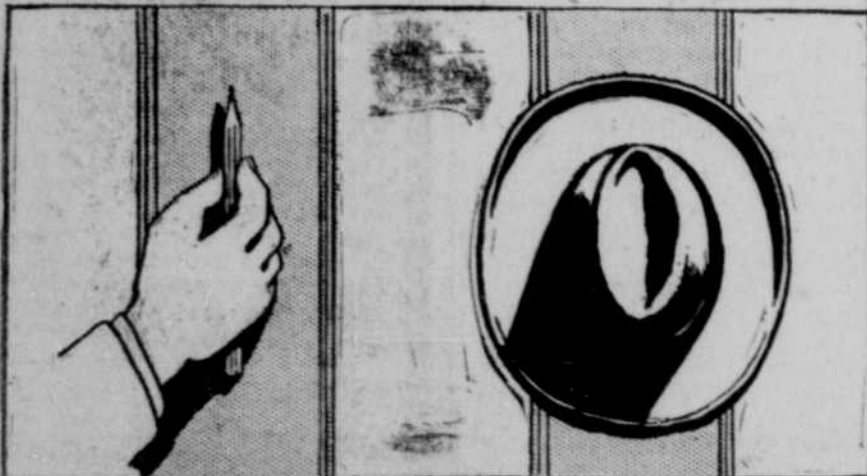
Prepare for this trick by placing a little wax or other adhesive substance on the nail of the middle finger of your right hand.

SOME CAPERS WITH MYSTERIOUS NUMBER 142,857

Arithmetic puzzle featuring the number 142,857. It shows that multiplying by 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 results in numbers where the digits are rearranged. Multiplying by 7 results in 999,999. A note says 'ADD THESE FIGURES ACROSS AND YOUR ANSWER IS 27, WHICH WHEN DIVIDED BY 3 IS REDUCED TO 9.'

Take this number 142,857, multiply it by 2, and the answer is 285,714. Notice that the same figures appear in the answer as are in the original number.

The United States senate will soon act on the beer bill recently passed by the house. The senate subcommittee amended the bill passed by the house by reducing the alcoholic content of the beer to 3.5 per cent and added wine to it.

NEBRASKA VETERANS RECEIVED NEARLY NINE MILLIONS

Uncle Sam spent \$8,711,794 on the war veterans of Nebraska during the fiscal year 1932, which ended last June 30.

A total of 365 Nebraska veterans were still hospitalized in 1932. John Thomas Taylor, vice chairman of the American Legion's national legislative committee, told the joint veterans' committee of congress.

Of the total \$8,711,794 of federal funds expended in Nebraska, \$1,453,496, or an average of \$500 each went to 2,904 veterans as disability compensation; \$867,168, or \$207 each, went to 4,176 as disability allowances; \$277,942 was for death compensation in 740 cases; \$43,617, or an average of \$1,677, went to twenty-six retired Nebraska officers as emergency officers' retirement pay.

THE "BATTLEFIELD MINATURE."

A Union soldier found on the battlefield of Appomattox back in 1865 a miniature which may turn out to be a rare likeness of Mary Washington, the mother of our first President.

"On the morning of April 9, 1865, a Union soldier, bugler in the Third Brigade, Twenty-fourth army corps, of

the Virginia Volunteer Infantry of the Union Army, kicked aside a heap of brown leaves in a little patch of woods in the path of Lee's retreat and picked up a red morocco leather case.

"The patch of woods fringed an old road running north and south and lying west of Appomattox Courthouse and Lee's army and it lay directly across Lee's path of retreat. The position held by the company of which the bugler was a part was a very responsible and at the same time critical one.

"The beauty of that painting, the exquisite coloring, the fine workmanship—more than all—a familiar expression on that strange and dignified countenance excited the admiration and wonder of Wirt Phillips. He inspected his find with great pleasure.

"Here was the head and shoulders of a woman of middle age, portly, serene, dignified, a little stern. She was dressed in the high muslin cap and deep fichu of another period—the period just gone, the period that ushered in the hoopskirts and lace mittens of the civil war period.

"Near the patch of leaves where he had picked up the morocco case lay the body of a man. He was not twenty-five feet away, flung out in his buttoned uniform, perhaps the last man slain outright in the civil war.
