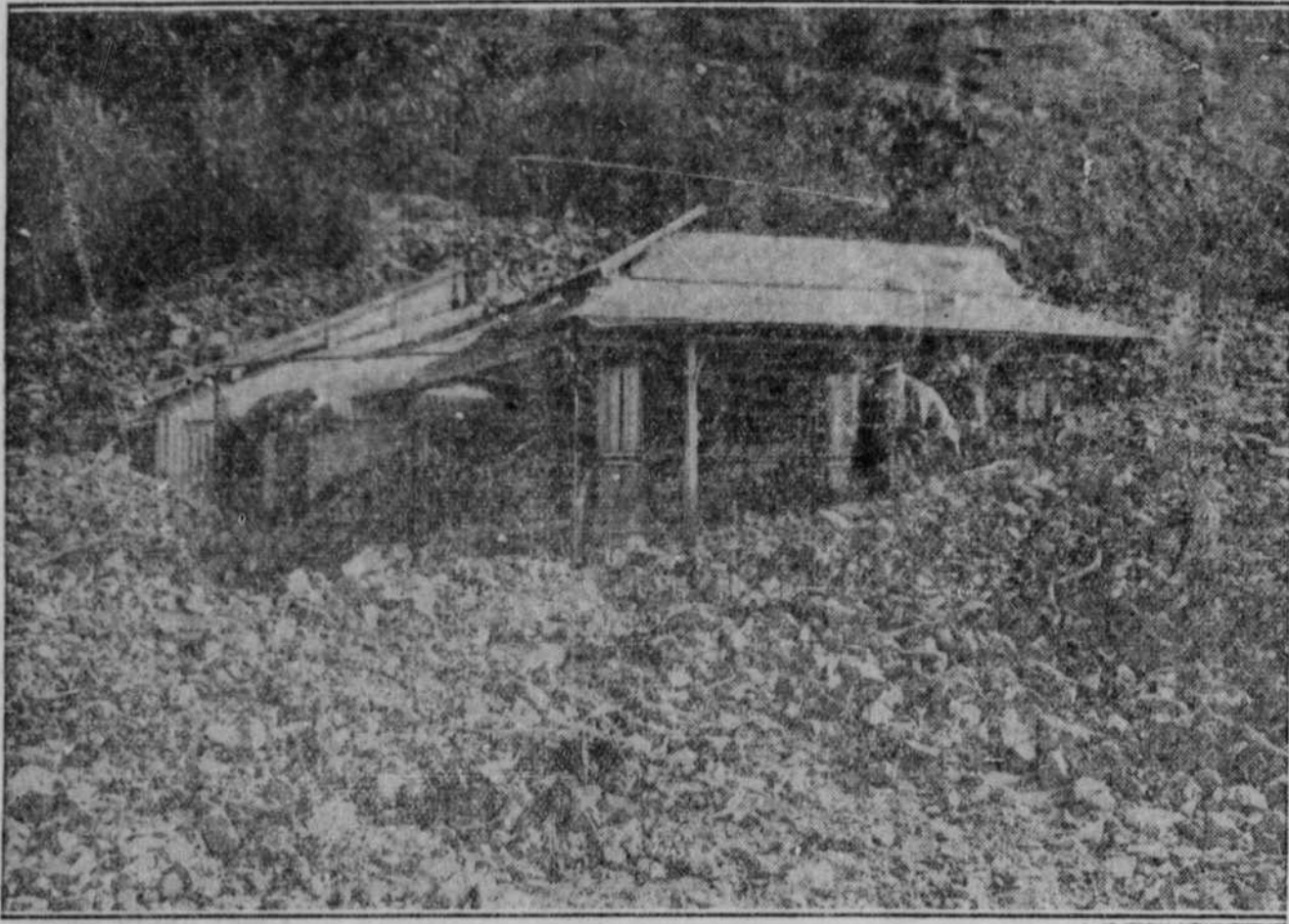
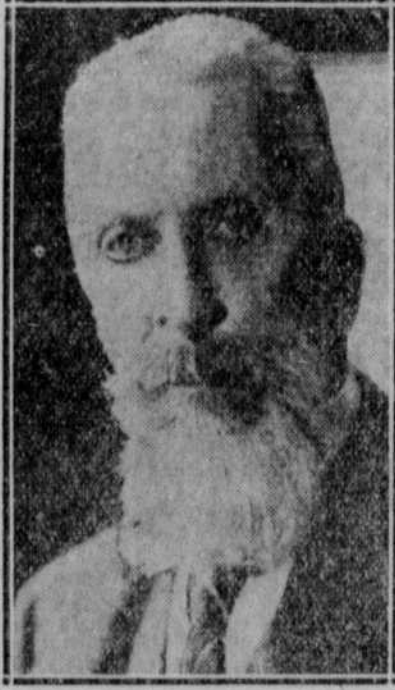


### Scene of Avalanche in California

### Career Ended



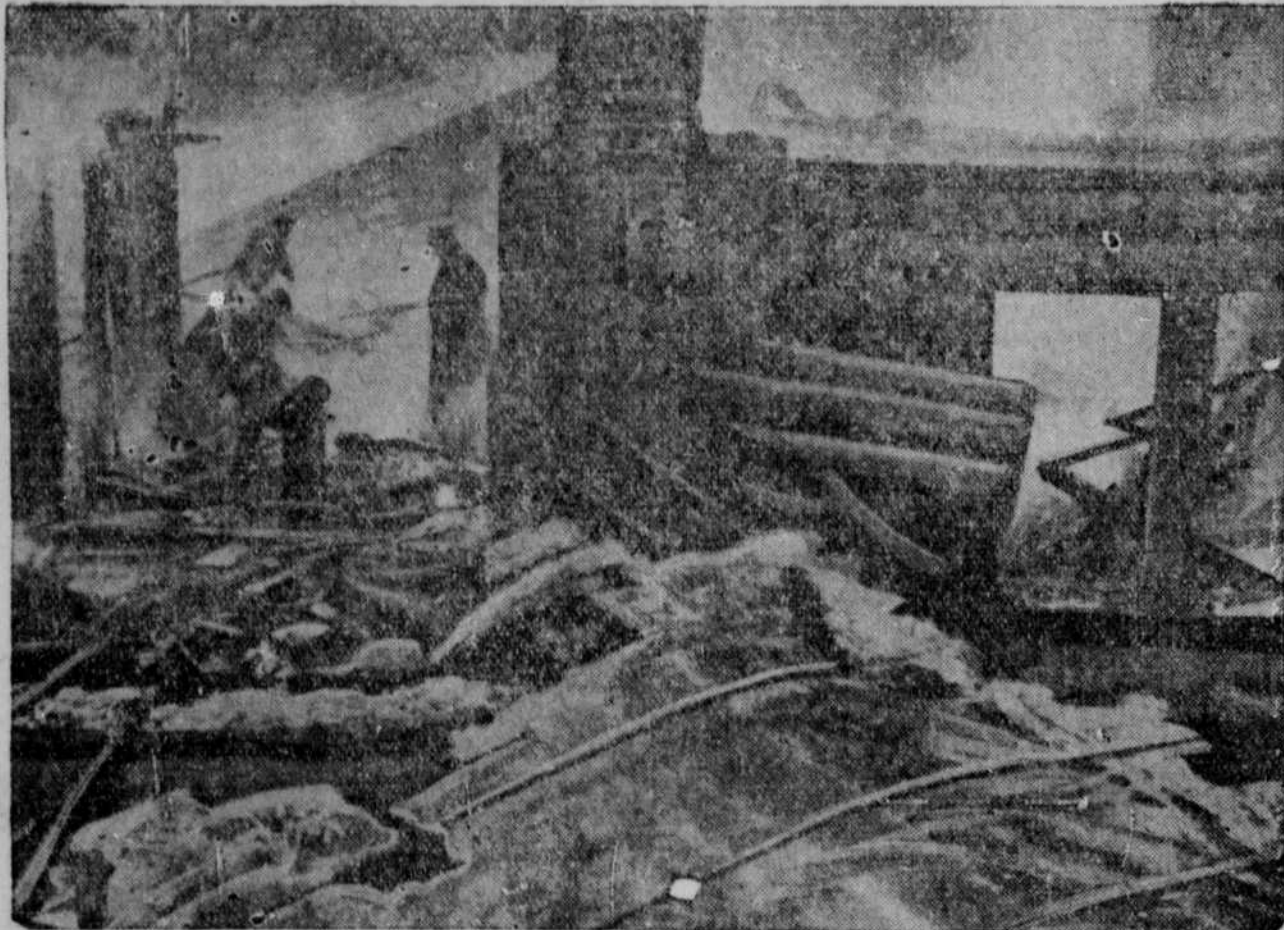
