## NEW BEER BILL PENDING.

A new beer bill is pending in the Nebraska legislature. It is a bill to allow the manufacture of 3.2 beer in Nebraska for shipment and sale outside of the state. It was reported favorably by the senate judiciary committee last Monday. The new bill would require a bond of \$10,000 from the manufacturer and permits would be issued every year.

## THE IOWA UPRISING

The trouble that has been brewing in northwestern Iowa for several months past between some farmers and representatives of farm loan companies came to a head last week in LeMars, Iowa, and as a result Plymouth county, of which LeMars is the county seat and Crawford county of which Dennison is the county seat are under martial law and governed by state troops.

The latter part of last week a band of men, numbering several hundred, entered the court house at LeMars and striding into the chambers of Judge Bradley, district judge for that district, tried to get him to promise that he would not sign any more foreclosure decrees. The judge refused to make any promises telling them that he would follow the law and his best judgment as long as he was on the bench. They then took him out of the court room and manhandled him a little on the court house lawn, then took him several miles out in the country, where they manhandled him and treated him to a coat of tar and grease, and put a rope around his neck. They finally left him without doing him any serious bodily injury.

The Governor at once declared martial law and sent the state troops into that section of the state. For several days they have been arresting men who are said to have been implicated in the assault upon the judge and they now have seventy-two men in jail, and more arrests are expected daily.

According to the daily press many of the men implicated in the assault upon the judge were not bonafide farmers, but loungers around LeMars and other towns in that vicinity. Whoever they are they should be severely punished and made to realize that the law will protect its sworn officers while they are doing their duty. If we are to enjoy the blessings of a free country we must have respect for the law. Such doings as that over in Iowa brings on anarchy, disrespect for law and order and the rights of others.

## Spraying Fruit Trees

In the growing of fruits, spraying is perhaps of the most vital importance during May. As soon as the petals have dropped from cherries, pears, and apples, the trees should be sprayed with a mixture of lime-sulfur and lead arsenate. The lead arsenate kills leaf eating insects and the lime-sulfur controls fungus pests like scab and black rot on the apples and shot-hole fungous of cherries. If the orchard is small and contains various kinds of fruits, then the various kinds of fruit will probably be sprayed with the same mixture and the strengths to use are 1 gallon of liquid lime-sulfur and 1 1/2 pounds of lead arsenate to 50 gallons of water. In terms of a single gallon of spray this would be 2 tablespoons of lead arsenate and 3 fluid ounces of liquid lime-sulfur. If dry lime-sulfur is preferred then 1 ounce of this material is used per gallon of spray mixture. Where cherries are sprayed commercially the lime-sulfur is used at the rate of 1 1/2 gallon per 50 of water. This strength is not recommended for apples, however, because it has a tendency to injure the foliage and fruit, especially when the humidity is high.

## Limestone Increases Gain

In two calf wintering trials at the Nebraska Experiment station the gain produced by silage, cottonseed cake, and ground limestone was 6 per cent and 9 per cent higher than gain produced by silage and cottonseed cake without the ground limestone. The limestone was fed at the rate of one-tenth of a pound per head daily and the cottonseed cake at the rate of one pound per head daily. The calves had all the corn silage they wanted to eat.

three north, of range fourteen west to foreclose a tax deed issued to S. Y. Gillan & Co. by the county treasurer of Holt county for the delinquent taxes for the year 1927, said sale being made on November 9, 1928. That subsequently the said tax certificate was sold and assigned to the plaintiff who is now the owner and holder thereof. That he later paid the taxes for the years 1928, 1929 and 1930 and that there is now due and unpaid the sum of \$326.95 and he asks the court to determine the amount due and that if same is not paid within a reasonable time that the land be sold to satisfy the amount due.

Paul H. Gillen has also filed suit to foreclose a tax title against Bessie Graham Myers, et al., and the southwest quarter of section thirty-six, in township thirty-three north, of range fifteen west, for the delinquent taxes for the year 1927, said tax sale certificate being sold by the county treasurer on the 9th day of November, 1928. He later paid the taxes for the years 1928, 1929 and 1930 and he alleges that there is now due and unpaid the sum of \$289.79 and he asks the court to determine the amount due and that if same is not paid within a reasonable time that the land be sold to satisfy the amount due.

The Fremont Joint Stock Land Bank vs. Lawrence Murray, et al., is another new case on file in the district court. Action is brought to secure the payment of a note for \$4,200 given on October 13, 1927, upon which the interest and principal was to be paid semi-annually and to secure the payment of the above note mortgage was given on the following described real estate: Northeast quarter of section two, township 30 north, range twelve, and the south half of the northeast quarter and the north half of the southwest quarter of section thirty-four township thirty-one, range twelve. They allege that they failed to pay installments numbers nine, ten and eleven, due on April 1, 1932, October 1, 1932, and on April 1, 1933. They allege that there is now due, on the back payments, the sum of \$403.33. They ask the court to determine the amount due and that if same is not paid within a reasonable time that the land be sold to satisfy said amount.

The Fremont Joint Stock Land Bank vs. Ellen O. Sturdevant, et al., and the northeast quarter of section twenty-nine, township thirty north, range thirteen west of the 6th P. M. in Holt county, Nebraska. They allege that on January 5, 1929, the defendant gave her note for \$2,000.00, giving mortgage on the above land for security. They allege that default has been made in the payments as defendant failed to make payment number seven due on July 1, 1932, or payment number eight, due on January 1, 1933. They allege that there is now due the sum of \$2,096.99 and they ask that the land be sold to satisfy the amount due.

Joseph McDonald has filed suit in district court against Thomas L. McDonald seeking to compel the defendant to live up to an oral agreement made and entered into on or about August 11, 1929, and if said contract is not lived up to that the deed given by the plaintiff, as part of said oral agreement, be cancelled. The land in-

volved is the northwest quarter of section 5, township 32 north of range 15 west of the 6th p. m. in Holt county, Nebraska.
