BRIEFLY STATED

The bill to permit Nebraska breweries to manufacture and sell the new 3.2 beer to wet states outside of Nebraska passed the legislature with the emergency clause and is now in the hands of the governor, for his signature or rejection. He will probably permit this bill to become a law without his signature, as he did the bill legalizing the sale of the beer in the state.

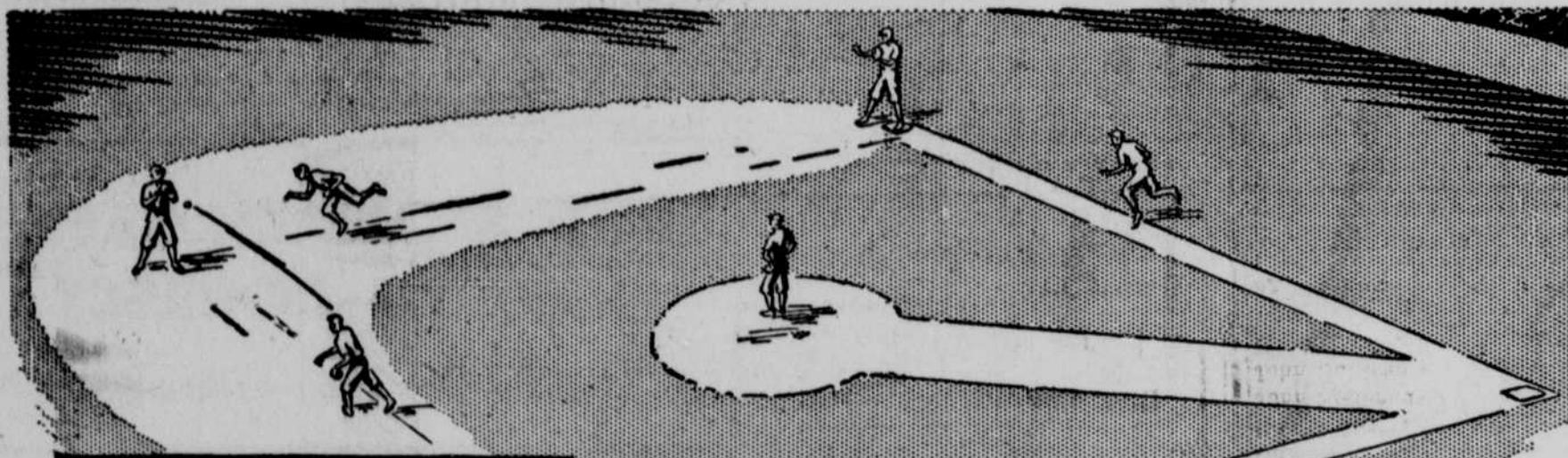
