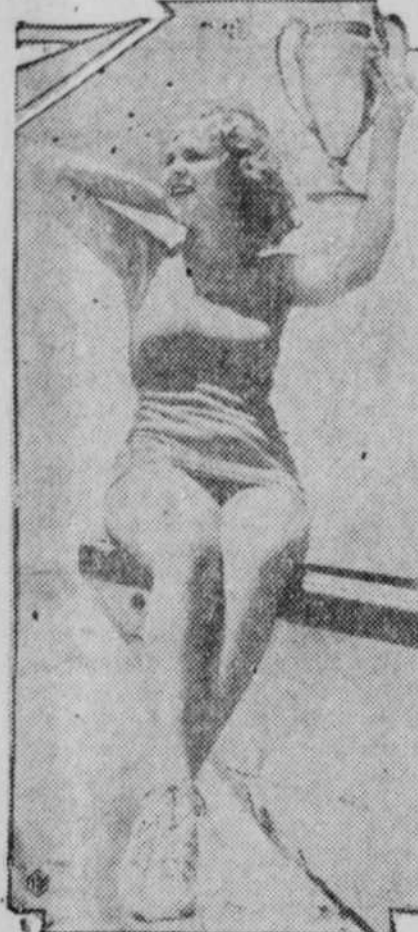


### Shimmy Queen a Bride for Third Time



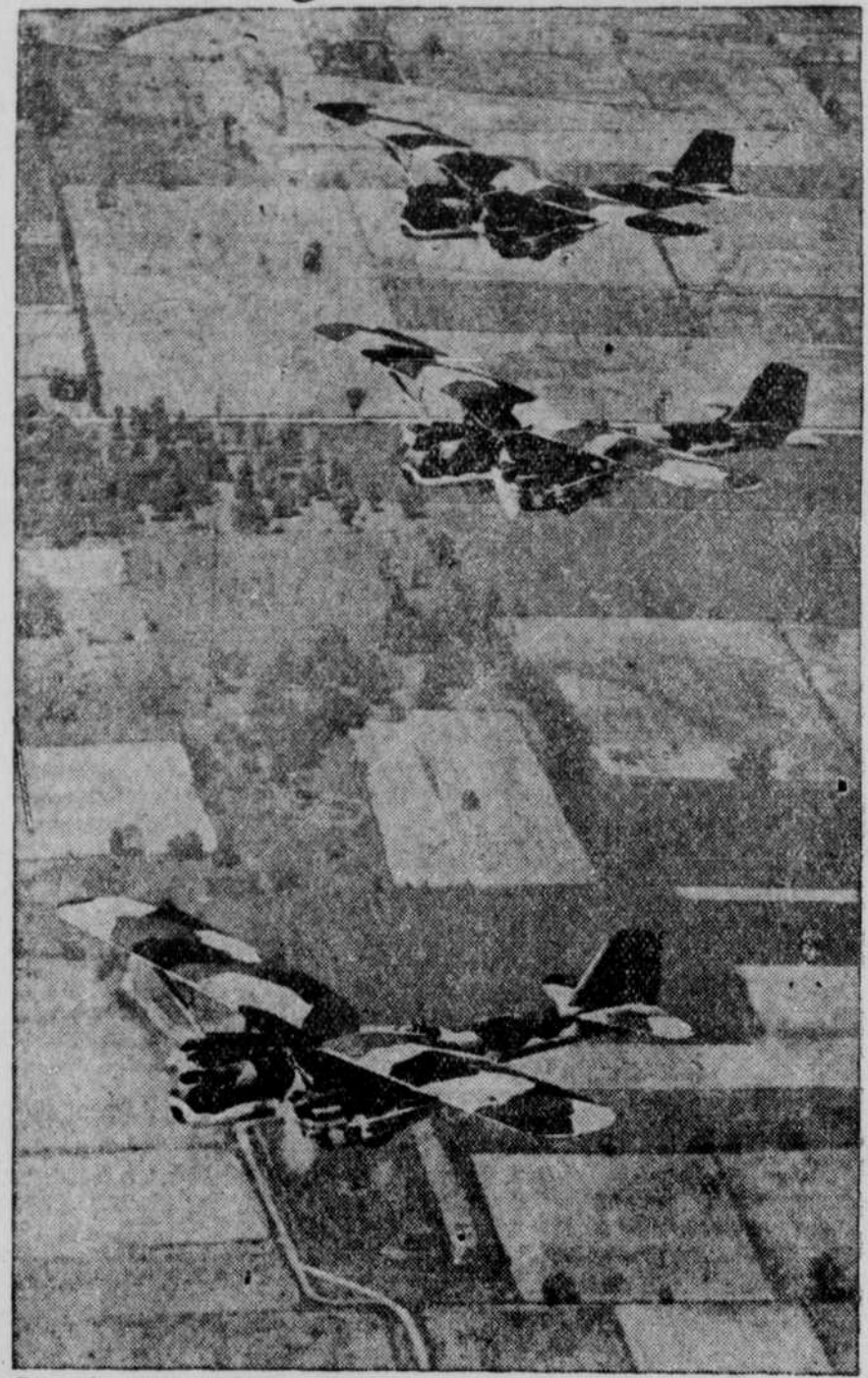

### A Leg(al) Bite



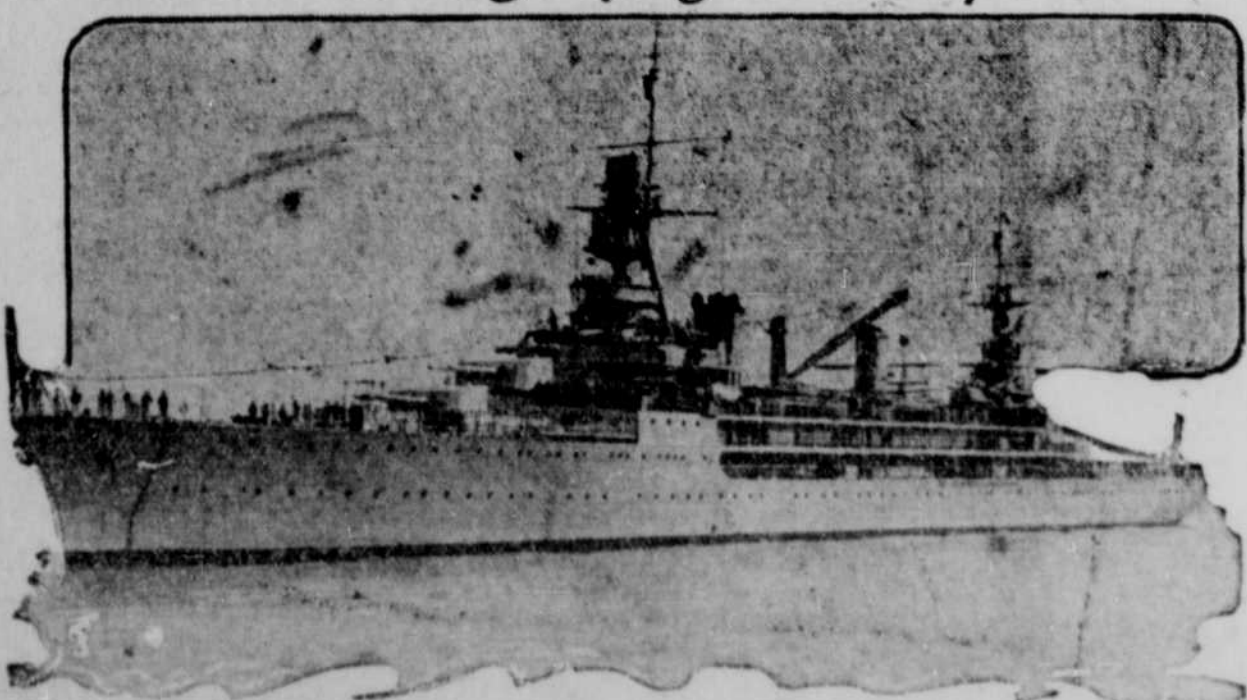
