ORDINANCE NO. 138-A
An ordinance providing for "The Annual Appropriation Bill" of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska for the fiscal year commencing on the first Tuesday in May, 1933 and ending on the first Tuesday in May, 1934.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska:

Section 1: That the corporate authorities of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, do hereby appropriate the following sums of money, which are deemed necessary to defray all necessary expenses and liabilities of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska during the fiscal year beginning on the first Tuesday in May, 1933 and ending on the first Tuesday in May, 1934:
