

**R. R. MORRISON INJURED  
IN ACCIDENT AT FREMONT**

Fremont Tribune: The second severe injury suffered in the past week by automobilists while driving over "dips" in the pavement at street intersections on North Broad street was reported Monday morning. R. R. Morrison, a grocer at O'Neill, suffered a wrecked back, lacerations and bruises when he was thrown against the top of a sedan driven by Frank Dishner, an O'Neill real estate man. Morrison was riding in the rear seat of the car.

The two O'Neill business men were en route to Omaha. After Morrison's injury they stopped here, calling J. E. Daly, a personal friend. Medical attention was given Morrison and he continued to Omaha. Although he was able to continue the trip to the state metropolis to transact business this morning, he was ordered to go to bed as soon as possible and remain there until he has recovered from his injuries, it was reported.

Dishner had turned the Twenty-third street corner from highway 30 to the route of 30-S, extending south on Broad street and did not notice the depression. He said he was not driving fast when the car struck the drainage "dip." The jolt in the front seat

was not heavy, he said, but it was sufficient in the rear seat to throw Morrison violently against the top.

E. J. Hested, of Fairbury, a tourist, was injured in a similar accident last Thursday night. His injuries were of such an extent that he was confined in the Richmond hospital for treatment.

The city council and Dodge county board of supervisors recently took steps to remove the drainage depressions on Broad street. City and County Engineer L. M. Roessler said this morning he has prepared plans to start immediately with the removal of the "dips" built in brick pavement. He has been obtaining information concerning cost of material for removing the depressions in concrete paving and only this morning received the figures of the costs. These "dips" will be removed as soon as arrangements can be made.

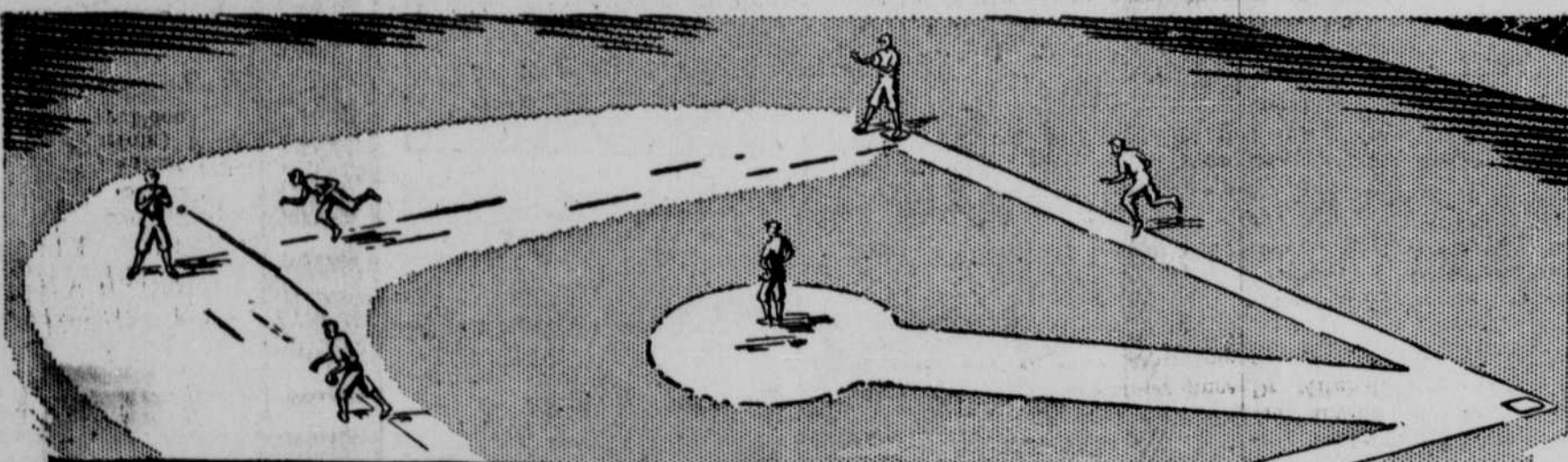
