Little Expert



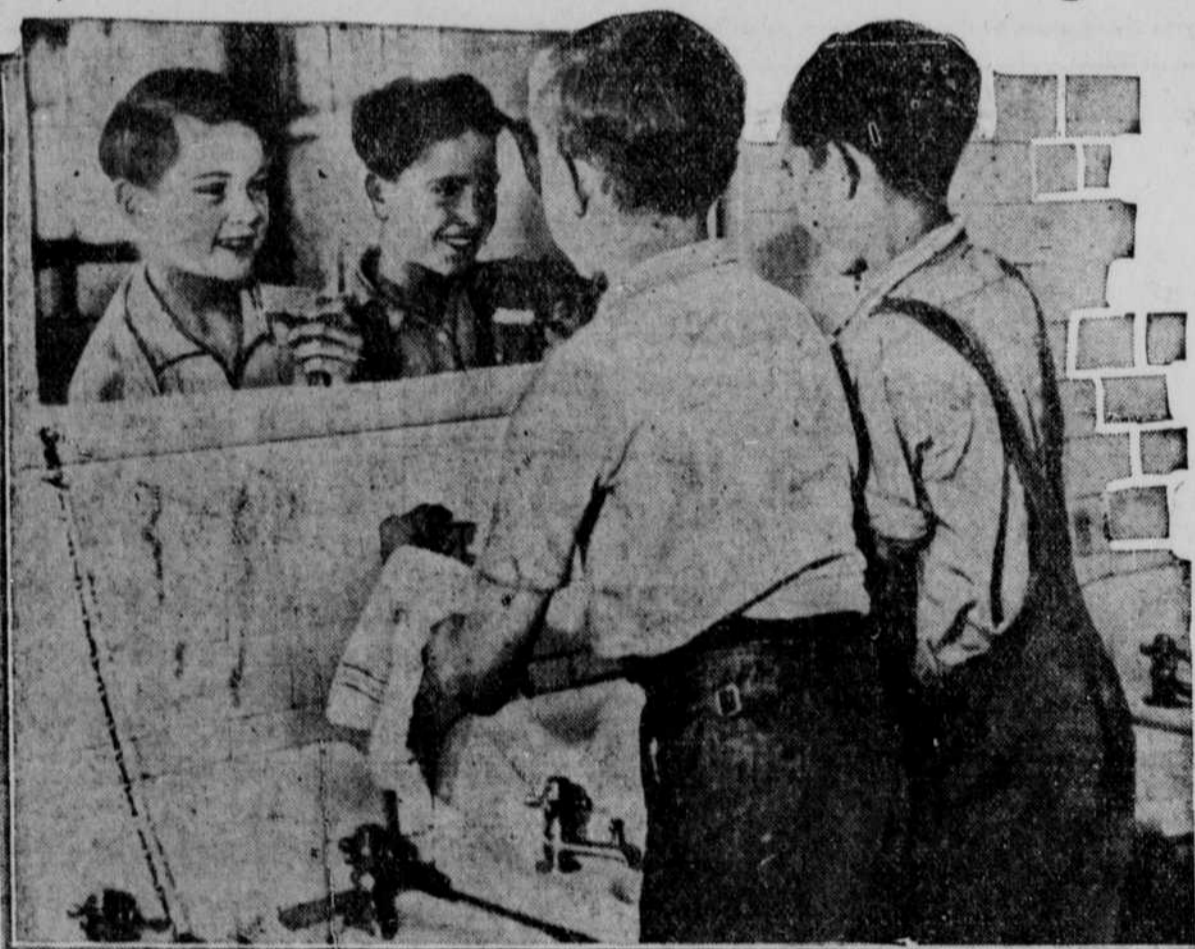

And Now Golf Has Gone Wet



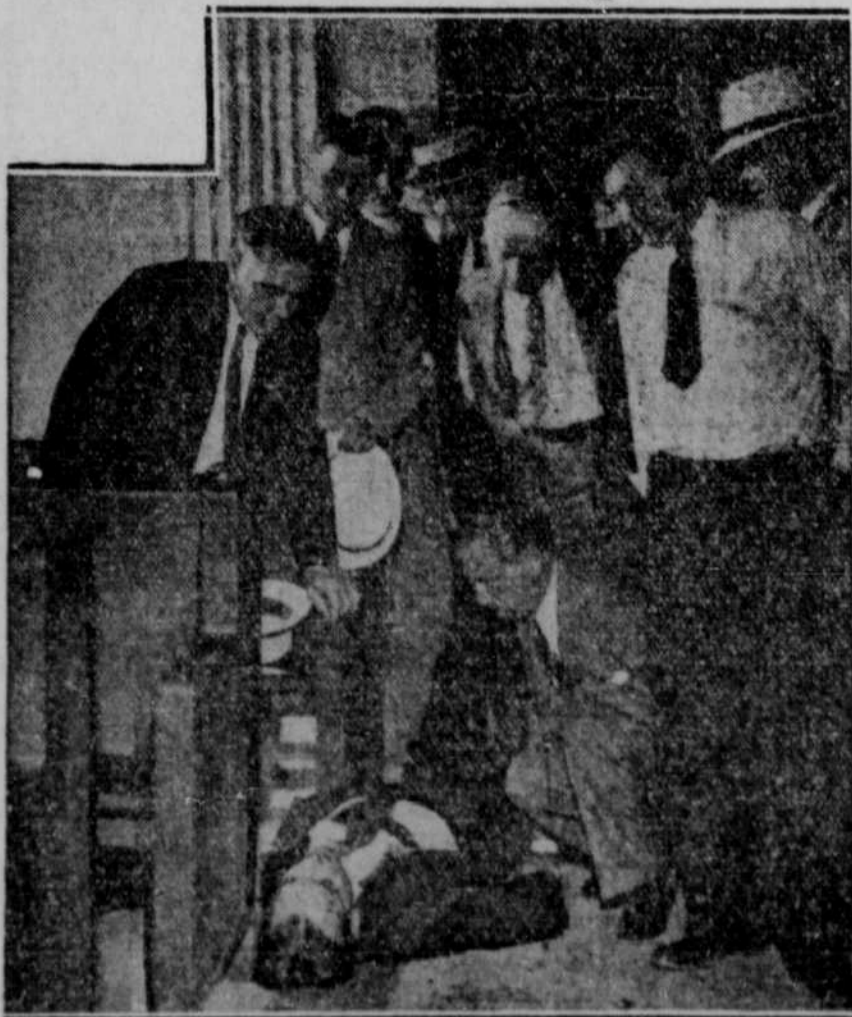

Dangled from Plane



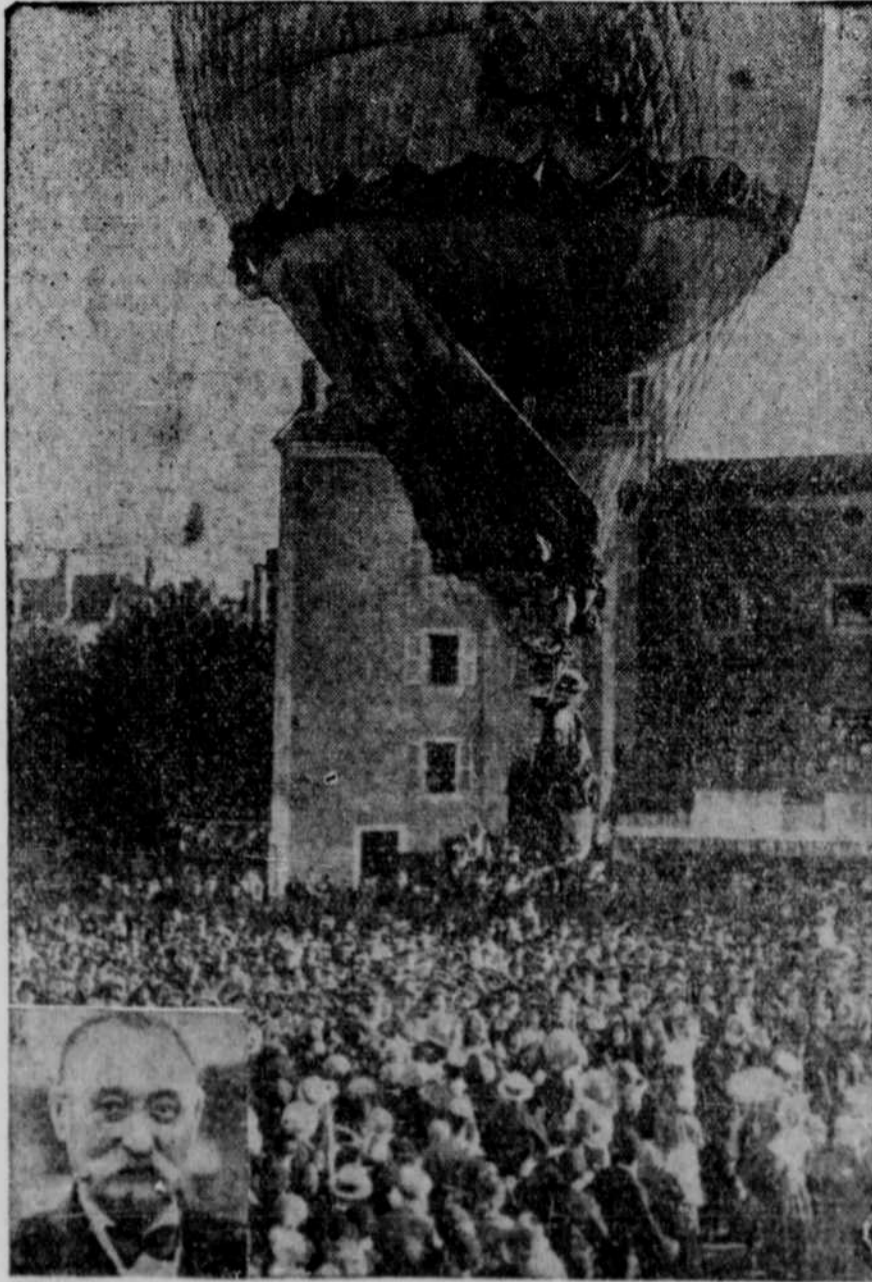
