

McMILLAN AND MARKEY RUN AN EXCELLENT BAKERY AND CAFE; KEEP IT UP-TO-DATE

There is probably no other town in the state, the size of O'Neill, that has as modern and well equipped, sanitary bakery as that operated by McMillan and Markey in this city, who have been operating a bakery here for the past twenty-two years. This bakery is one of the places in the city that the people of O'Neill point to with pride and their products are as good as can be obtained in any bakery anywhere, and has won for them an enviable reputation in all parts of the state.

In June, 1911, the late F. D. McMillan and his sister-in-law, Miss Markey, started a bakery in the cement block building that had been erected by the late T. V. Golden a few years previous. All the latest machinery was installed and they started, what has become one of O'Neill's most successful business enterprises. From the day of the opening they prided themselves upon the quality of their products and have met with splendid success in their undertaking. From the first day the business has been successful and has continued so, the owners, Mrs. F. D. McMillan and her sister, Miss Markey, insisting that the high quality of their goods be maintained, even at the expense of profits, and their products are recognized as being as good as can be purchased in any bakery in the state.

Their business increased and in 1913 they purchased the building that housed their bakery and immediately added to the building and installed new machinery, so that they could better take care of their large and growing list of customers.

Business continued to improve and the demand for McMillan and Markey bread and pastries continued to increase so that in 1930 they again remodeled the bakery and installed new machinery of the latest improved patterns and again extended their building, so that they now occupy a building 22x170 feet, fitted with the latest and most improved machinery to be found on the market. They also installed a cafe and equipped it with the latest improved machinery and catered to the wants of those desiring a tastily served meal of good wholesome food at popular prices. This also proved a success and in 1931 it was remodeled, at a cost of several thousand dollars, and it is now one of the neatest and most attractive dining rooms in any city in the state, not even excepting the metropolis. As one of the prominent business places in the city the bakery and cafe gives employment to fourteen people, besides the two proprietors. Three of these are in the bakery proper, the other eleven in the cafe and at the counter selling baked goods.

The oven has a capacity of 500 loaves and is one of the most modern that money could purchase and expert labor construct. The different machines for getting the flour ready to be made into bread and the bread ready for the market are all operated by individual electric motors. From the time the flour is put into the mixing vat, operated by an electric motor, until it comes out of the oven and is placed in the wrapping machine it is unnecessary to touch the bread by hand, machinery, of the latest improved models, performing all the duties the average housewife performs in the making of bread. It is a high class and exceptional bakery to be found in a city of this size and is a credit to the city. Their products are also of an exceptional quality and

have won commendation for their excellence by people from several parts of the state.

This article would not be complete without mention of the man who, thru his ability as a baker, is responsible for the excellent quality of the McMillan and Markey baked goods, Peter Heriford, the baker. Mr. Heriford came here when the bakery started and for over twenty-two years he has presided as head baker in this establishment, a position he has filled with ability, as the excellence of the baked delicacies he produces testifies.

Mrs. McMillan and Miss Markey are proud of their bakery, and they have just reason to be. They would like the people of this city and county to call at any time and they will be pleased to show them through this sanitary establishment and show them the various machines that are used in the production of their baked goods.

The Neligh Junior American Legion team, the champions of Nebraska, were in the city Tuesday evening on their way home from Stuart where that afternoon they took into camp the Junior American Legion team of Gregory, South Dakota, the champions of that state, with a score of 4 to 3. This game was one of the attractions at the Fall Festival at Stuart Tuesday. The Stuart and Atkinson base ball teams also played that afternoon and Atkinson went down to defeat with a score of 6 to 2. Honeycutt of O'Neill pitched for Stuart and retired twenty-one members of the Atkinson team via the strike-out route.

IN DISTRICT COURT

G. D. Janzing has filed suit in the district court against Edward A. Moyer, et al., to foreclose a mortgage on the northeast quarter of section 27, township 29, north of range 13, in Holt county, Nebraska.

In his petition he alleges that on September 11, 1928, Herman D. Janzing took a note for \$3,000 and a mortgage on the above premises as security. The mortgage was to draw six percent interest and five coupon notes for \$180.00 were given. He alleges that the first three coupon notes were paid, but that coupon number 4 was not paid, nor were the taxes for the year 1932. On June 4, 1929, the mortgage and notes were assigned to the plaintiff, who is now the owner and holder thereof. He alleges that there is now due the sum of \$3,000 and the coupon unpaid as well as the unpaid taxes. He asks that the court determine the amount due and if same is not paid within a reasonable time that the land be sold.

Selma A. Pancoast has filed suit against William E. Bishop, et al., to foreclose a mortgage on the southwest quarter of section 34, township 27, north of range 10. The petition alleges that on April 15, 1931 the plaintiff loaned William E. Bishop and his wife \$1,600 and took their note for that amount and a mortgage on the above land as security. That on or about May 23, 1933, one A. L. Bishop, assignee of a deficiency judgment granted in the district court of Holt county, having caused an execution to issue on said deficiency judgment and having procured the sale of the said premises obtained a confirmation of said sale and a deed to said premises. They allege that his claim is junior and inferior to the rights of plaintiff herein. They further allege that the defendants have failed to pay the \$100 note due on April 15, 1932, and also the one for the same amount due on April 15, 1933, also that they failed

to pay the interest due on the two notes amounting to \$90 and that they also neglected to pay the taxes due for 1932, amounting to \$21.71 and that there is now due and unpaid the sum of \$1,698.00. They ask the court to determine the amount due and to declare that the plaintiffs mortgage is a first lien on the premises and that the land be sold to satisfy the amount found due. They also ask that a receiver be appointed to take charge of said premises and collect the rent and profits pending the proceedings of the action.

Henry Sachacht, guardian of Henry Sachacht, Jr., has petitioned the court to permit him to mortgage a piece of property owned jointly by himself and his ward, so that they can pay the taxes due on other property owned jointly by them in South Dakota and Texas.

Anna M. Kashmett has filed suit for divorce from Moses J. Kashmett. In her petition she alleges that they were married on August 2, 1924 at Council Bluffs, Iowa, and that he deserted her two years later. She alleges that she has not heard from him for more than two years and that she does not know where he is. She asks for an absolute divorce and for the restoration of her maiden name, Anna Johnson, and for such other relief as may be just and equitable.

The Fremont Joint Stock Land Bank has filed suit against James A. Ernest, et al., and the west half of section 13, township 28, range 9, west of the 6th P. M., on a note for \$7,000.00 given on February 11, 1925. They allege that installment number 14, due on March 1, 1932, except the sum of \$75, and that installments numbers 15 and 16 have not been paid. They ask for foreclosure for the amount of the delinquent payments.

the territory, in each and every direction, without the corporate limits and within two miles of Ewing.

Zone Eight—Shall consist of all of the territory, in each and every direction, without the corporate limits and within two miles of Chambers.

Zone Nine—Shall consist of all of the balance of Holt county.

The hours, days and times when said beverage may be sold in Zones One to Eight inclusive shall be the same as are provided by ordinance or other regulations in the cities, towns or villages within said zones, and each licensee if located in Zone One to Eight inclusive shall be governed, as to hours time and days of operation, by the rules and regulations governing licensees within the town, city or village in the zone in which he is located.

No licensee shall sell, offer for sale or permit to be sold or offered for sale any such beverage on the premises covered by his said license or elsewhere, except at the hours and within the times and on the days specified by the ordinance or otherwise by the city, town or village situated in his zone.

No licensee shall be issued to anyone in any zone in which the town, city or village therein has refused to issue licenses.

No licensee shall keep, sell, offer for sale or have upon the premises covered by his license any beverage containing more than 3.2 per cent of alcohol by weight.

No licensee shall permit others to sell, offer for sale, keep or keep for sale upon the premises covered by his license any beverage containing more than 3.2 per cent alcohol by weight.

Every licensee shall personally manage, supervise, conduct and have charge of the sale of permitted beverages under the license issued.

The license fee of "On Sale" license shall be, and the same hereby is, fixed at \$25.00 per year, each.

Any licensee violating or permitting to be violated upon the license premises, any of the rules and regulations above promulgated, shall have his license summarily revoked and cancelled.

All licenses shall be issued subject to these rules and regulations and said

rules and regulations are hereby made a part of each license issued.

All applications for licenses shall be advised of the within rules and regulations and shall, as a condition precedent to issuance of a license, be required to subscribe thereto.
