IN DISTRICT COURT

Alfred Beutler has filed suit in the district court against Bernard Gardzilewski, et al., to foreclose a mortgage given on August 14, 1919, for \$4,000.00 on the west half of section 10, and the west half of section 11, township 20 north, of range 16 west of the 6th P.M.

In his petition he alleges that the mortgage was given by Myrtle Hofland at that time owner of the property, to Mayland and Butterfield. On October 30, 1919, they sold the note and mortgage to R. H. Parker who in turn sold it to the Lincoln Safe Deposit Company, who sold it to the plaintiff in this action. He alleges that they failed to pay the interest due on March 1, 1932, amounting to \$125 and have made no payments since. He alleges that there is now due and unpaid the sum of \$4,518.50. He asks that an accounting be had to determine the amount due and that if same is not paid that the land be sold to satisfy the amount found due.

Julia G. Warner has filed suit in the

district court asking that the estate of the late Anton J. Warner, who died in this county on January 1, 1930 be divided. Mrs. Warner is the widow of the deceased. She alleges that there is a mortgage on the real estate of \$2,500 which is past due and asks a division of the property so that the indebtedness can be paid off. If the property cannot be divided then she asks that the land be sold.

Thomas Richards has filed suit against Michael Fleming, et al., to foreclose a mortgage for \$500 given on May 31, 1927, on the west half of the northwest quarter of section 12, township 29 north, of range 14 west of the 6th P. M. He alleges in his petition that they have failed to pay the interest due on May 31, 1931, or any interest since that date. He also alleges that they have failed to pay the taxes for the years 1927 to date and that he has been compelled to pay them to protect his interest in the property. He alleges that there is now due the sum of \$865.40 and he asks for an accounting and judgment against the defendants for the amount due and that if same is not paid within a reasonable time that the land be sold.

Llydia Ruth Lee has filed suit for divorce from Thomas W. Lee. She alleges that they were married at Bonesteel, South Dakota, on September 3, 1931, and that since their marriage they have been residents of Holt county, Nebr. She alleges cruel and inhuman treatment and non support, and she asks for an absolute divorce and the custody of their child, Darrell Gene Lee, ten months old. She also asks attorneys fees and suitable allowance for the support of the child.

The Storz Brewing Co., of Omaha, the first of the week remitted \$5,334 to the secretary of agriculture, at Lincoln, the tax on the beer sold by them during the past month at 93 cents per barrel. The beer tax so far received at Lincoln is \$12,000.

D. C. LaRue, 36, of Kearney, was killed in an auto accident near Omaha last Tuesday. His car had apparently skidded in mud which covered the pavement, was hurled into a ravine and crashed into a tree. He had been visiting a son in Omaha and was on his way home when the accident occurred.
