Veterans Must File New Applications

The following reply was received in response to a query sent by Joel Parker. This seems to clear several points of interest to veterans, points made hazy through constantly changing conditions and decrees:

Lincoln, Nebr., December 5, 1933.

Joel L. Parker, Adjutant, American Legion, O'Neill.

Dear Mr. Parker: In reply to yours of the first instant, let me advise that in the case of any veteran whether he is receiving disability allowance or any benefit, whatsoever, from the Government prior to July 1, 1933, he must file a new application for either war-time service connected disability pension or war-time non-service connected disability pension. After this claim is filed he is then notified by the Veterans Administration that he has six months from the date of that notification in which his evidence must be complete.

I trust this will furnish you with the necessary information.
