Finds No Statute To Close Nudist Colonies

District Attorney Whelan, referred to in the following which was clipped from the Los Angeles Times of May 24, 1934, explains itself but a few may not recall that the district attorney referred to was born in O'Neill and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Whelan. The father was mayor of O'Neill and a live wire here as he and his sons are live wires in California. The clipping was sent The Frontier by M. F. O'Sullivan, of Los Angeles. Whelan is district attorney of San Diego county, California:

"San Diego county nudists rejoiced today. There will be no ban on nudist colonies in San Diego county.

"So decided Dist.-Atty. Whelan today after more than a week of diligent searching the law books for some law through which nudists might be forced to don shorts—or something.

"I even went out and investigated two of the groups," he said, "and there seems to be nothing wrong about it, thus reversing his expressed determination to close them up.

"Regarding Campo Nudists near Jamul, which became the center of fire of a group of church women, Whelan said:

"After investigation I cannot find they are breaking any laws. They seem to be a group of friends. The day we were there there were three men without wives, three women without husbands, two men and their wives engaged in what they assert to be health measures.

"Therefore, until a person appears who can testify that any member of this group has exposed himself in a public place where other persons were present, who were offended, I think there can be no prosecution."

"A second colony has been established near La Mesa and a third is being organized for a tract near Tecate. This is the group which was denied a permit for colonization near Tijuana," Mexico.

In District Court

The Lincoln Joint Stock Land Bank has brought suit against James Baird, et al., and the south half and northwest quarter of section 13, and north half and the east half of the southeast quarter and the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter and the northeast quarter of the southwest quarter of section 14; the east half of section 23, and the north half of the northwest quarter and the southwest quarter

er of the northwest quarter and the northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section 24; and the northwest quarter and the north half of the northeast quarter of section 26, all in township 31, north, range 11. They allege that they failed to pay the interest coupons due and payable on June 1, 1933 and December 1, 1933 and that the 1932 and 1933 taxes were not paid. They allege that there is now due and payable the sum of \$15,373.47. They allege that James Baird sold and transferred his interest in the above real estate and that Art Aucker is now the owner of record and in possession. They ask the court to determine the amount due and if same is not paid within a reasonable time that the land be sold.

The Lincoln Joint Stock Land Bank has filed suit against Flora P. Dudley, et al., to foreclose a mortgage for \$7,000 given on April 3, 1926, on the west half of section 9; the east half of the northwest quarter, the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter, the northwest quarter of the southeast quarter and the northeast quarter of section 8; east half of northwest quarter, the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter and the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of section 20, all in township 31, north of range 10 west of the 6th P. M. They allege that they neglected and failed to pay installments No. 14, 15 and 16, due April 1, 1933, October 1, 1933 and April 1, 1934, each in the sum of \$224. Also that they failed to pay the taxes for the years 1931, 1932 and 1933, and that there is now due and payable the sum of \$7,763.17. They ask the court to determine the amount due and if not paid that the land be sold.

May E. Hart has filed suit against Lula E. Carpenter, et al., and the west half of the southwest quarter of section 7, west half of the northwest quarter of section 18, township 26, range 14, and north half of northeast quarter of section 13, township 26, north, range 15 west of the 6th P. M., given on September 1, 1928, for the amount of \$4,000, payable in five years. She alleges in her petition that the interest is due thereon since September 1, 1931, and that they have neglected to pay the taxes due on the land since 1927 and that the taxes since 1928 were not paid by defendant. She alleges that there is now due thereon the sum of \$4,882.31. She asks the appointment of a receiver to conserve the assets of the real estate and that the court determine the amount due and that if same is not paid within a reasonable time the land be sold.

The Lincoln National Life Insurance Company has filed suit against Julia Braddock Gilmore, et al. They allege that they are the owners in fee simple and entitled to the immediate possession of the following described real estate: All of section 1, township 28, north, of range 12, and the east half of the southwest quarter and the northeast quarter of section 31, the south half and northwest quarter of section 32; all of section 33 and all of section 34, all in township 29 north, of range 12. They allege that the defendants are in possession of said property, and are claiming some right, title and interest therein, the nature and extent of which is unknown to plaintiff. Therefore they pray that it may be decreed to be the owner of said premises and that they are entitled to immediate possession thereof.
