Just as the Sioux were receiving their orders to charge across the river and kill every Pawnee, United States Army bugles sent their wondrous echoes among the hills and the Sioux chieftians cocked their ears and hung their heads. Horses were hurriedly mounted and at least 1,500 Brule Sioux struck off for their hideouts to the north and west. Every one of their own dead and wounded were taken with them.

The last all-Indian battle in the world became history. Rivulets of crimson dried. On that day, August 5, 1873, scores of children lay for hours helpless and dying in Massacre Canyon in a blistering sun. One little Pawnee girl was picked up on this battlefield in a dying condition, most of her blood staining the ground and grass, but she recovered and became a fine woman.
