with them. The last all-Indian battle in the world became history. Rivulets of crimson dried. On that day, August 5, 1873, scores of children lay for hours helpless and dying in Massacre Canyon in a blistering sun. One little Pawnee girl was picked up on this battlefield in a dying condition, most of her blood staining the ground and grass, but she recovered and became a fine woman.
