4-H Club State Champions

Champion Nebraska 4-H Club boys and girls in five different projects have been named for 1934. They are Rozetta Siemers, Cheyenne county canning; George Naahs, Lancaster county, corn; Luella Eberspacher, Seward county, home economics; Merlin Sanderson, Furnas county, baby beef.

L. I. Frisbie, state club leader at the Nebraska Agricultural college in Lincoln, notified Agricultural Agent, F. M. Reece, of the new state champions. Next year Holt county club members will probably compete for the same honors and the right to represent Nebraska at the National Club congress.

Drought or no drought, Rozetta Siemers does her canning. This year she put up nearly 1,000 quarts of various foods. Eighteen years old, she is active in church affairs in her home community. From the well known Eberspacher family comes Luella the 1934 home economics champion. In club work for 9 years, the Seward county girl is an excellent judge and was on the championship song group from that county for three consecutive years.

The state swine champion, Geo. Maahs, has been in club work since 1929. Through his 4-H activities, he has built up his own herd of

Duroc hogs. Vern Finke, the corn champion, has compiled an outstanding record. By competing on championship demonstration teams and exhibiting prize winning corn, young Finke has grossed \$995.84 from his 4-H projects. Merlin Sanderson, the other champion, has been active in club work since 1930. He was a member of the state championship baby beef club from Furnas county for two years, 1932-33.
