You and each of you are hereby notified that there will be held a special meeting of the City Council of O'Neill, Nebraska, at the Council Chamber, on the 7th day of August, 1935 at 1:30 P. M.

The objects and purposes of said meeting will be as follows: 1. To pass, adopt and ordain Ordinance No. 162-A which Ordinance is creating and establishing Paving District No. 3.

The meeting was called to order by the Mayor. The following resolution was introduced by Councilman Hart and read:

RESOLUTION. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA, That Whereas, Fourth Street, between the north line of Douglas Street and the North Line of Benton Street, all within the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, is a main thoroughfare, leading to, and connecting with State Highways Numbers Eight, Twenty and Two Hundred Eighty-one, and which are a part of the State Highway System, and Whereas, As provided by Section 17-432, of the Session Laws of the State of Nebraska, for the year 1933, page 530, according to the Third provision thereof, gives the City Council the power to improve said thoroughfare,

Now, Therefore, be it resolved, on motion of the City Council, without petition of property owners or hearing, that said street, be ordered improved by draining, grading, curbing, guttering and paving and that an Ordinance be introduced and passed establishing the improvement on Fourth Street as above described.
