TO THE ORIENT WITH CONGRESS

(Continued from page 4.) ed of espionage. This congressman, who knows more about farm to market roads than he does about forts, is bewildered by a front page story carrying his name in connection with a spy plot.

Commissioner Francisco Delgado of the Philippines gets a front page story in the Nichi newspaper here. He is credited with being here for the sole purpose of getting information about Japanese fortifications. His real purpose here is to be with the congressional party. But nevertheless the Philippine commissioner is followed about the various towns we visit.

Soldiers and sailors who sailed into the Port of Yokohama will remember the forts at the mouth of the harbor. Some of them were destroyed by the last earthquake. Others have been rebuilt. But its almost a hanging word to talk about forts here. The spy system prevails. Even we are followed.

The American embassy in Tokio does a lot of entertaining. They have to do it to keep up with the Joneses of the embassies of the other nations. They gave a tea and reception for the visitors and thousands of people came. Like in Washington there seems to be a waste of gigantic amounts of food and liquid refreshments. To a con-

gressman from the corn-hog country it looks like a lot of waste of taxpayers money. But the scores of highly paid employees at the embassies say it is necessary. The Japanese are strict on all formal dress and formalities.

Railroad schedules are strictly maintained. A train is never late. It is an unforgivable sin to be ten seconds late at the station. They use both steam and electric trains. They installed the electric trains but kept the steam trains running for months before using the electric trains until the crews learned to run the electric trains perfectly. They are thorough—these Japanese.

Mr. Y. Kagami, of the NYK line family, about 28 years of age, educated in foreign lands, believes Japan will become westernized more rapidly than many other countries. He wears European clothes. Speaks English perfectly. He owns an automobile. This young man is the author of a book on Japan and the Orient, which is read extensively by travelers. He believes in modern things which older Japanese are somewhat timid about. He goes out after the business. He wants to meet people who buy, who ship freight and who sell tickets to tourists.

On board this ship is Major Anderson who has been in the Islands thirty-seven years. He is returning from a trip in South Africa. He knows many people in Omaha and Albion. He remembers when the first Nebraska volunteers arrived in Manila. He asks many questions about business conditions in the states. He is now rated as a millionaire in the Islands and has just finished a study of conditions in the south and east Africa. He states the dole for the poor whites is causing much consternation in that country. He brings out the results of the investigation into the poor white problem in Africa by the Carnegie corporation. This report shows that the work relief dole in that country is disturbing the government. Here is a brief statement which winds up that official report: "There is emphatic warning against the present system of indiscriminate doles which cause loss of independence and may imbue the recipients with a sense of inferiority, impairs their industry, weakens their sense of personal responsibility and helps to make them, dishonest."

Some observers say the special legislative session is to be praised for the things it refused to do rather than for what it did. They refer specifically to the legislators' refusal to enact the bills, introduced in Omaha's behalf, to allow cities and villages to issue bonds without a vote of the people to finance WPA projects and retire the bonds with gas tax funds, and the federal proposal to provide unemployment insurance.

However, if the federal unemployment insurance act survives the court test that is certain to come, Nebraska employers will be taxed an estimated \$2,400,000, at the rate of 1 per cent of their payrolls, in 1936, double that amount in 1937, and triple that amount in 1938, without benefit to Nebraska labor and industry.

Reasons given for rejecting the bill includes such words as "socialistic, visionary, economical unsoundness and fanatical." The general idea was that any bill passed on such short notice on so untried a subject would certainly be a mess, so better to wait at least until the unicameral legislature convenes.
