Mr. Chairman: I move the adoption of the following resolution: In view of the importance to the taxpayers of Holt county of the proposed Court House bond election to be held on November 12, the Board of Supervisors has deemed it wise and proper that every possible precaution be exercised against any deception or misrepresentation of the questions involved as to the merits or demerits of the proposed new Court House.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this Board that all clerks of the respective townships cities and villages of the county be, and they hereby are, requested to act on a committee and to appoint such other taxpayers of the township, city or village as may be deemed proper. Such committee to come to O'Neill prior to November 12 and investigate for themselves the condition of the present Court House and any other facts in which the taxpayers of their township, city or village might be interested.

This is likely to be the most important proposition that will confront the taxpayer of Holt county for some time to come, and it is thought by this board that the taxpayers of every township, city and village are sufficiently interested to send such a committee.
