ORDINANCE NO. 165-A An Ordinance fixing the salary to be received by and paid to the Police Magistrate of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, and repealing all other Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA: Section 1. That the salary of the Police Magistrate of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, shall be the sum of Fifty and no-one hundred Dollars (\$50.00) per year, payable in equal quarterly installments as other claims against the city from the general fund.

ORDINANCE NO. 167-A An Ordinance authorizing the issuance of Refunding Bonds of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, in the principal sum of \$12,000.00, to be designated and known as "City of O'Neill Refunding Bonds, Series C", and providing for the levy and collection of taxes for the payment of same.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA: Sec. 1. That the "City of O'Neill Refunding Bonds, Series A", bearing date January 1, 1926, drawing interest at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent per annum, payable annually, and of which amount \$12,000.00 remains unpaid and outstanding, and are valid interest bearing obligations of said City; that said City has insufficient funds on hand accumulated for the payment of these bonds. And the City in said sinking funds, has no funds sufficient with which to pay or redeem the amount of outstanding bonds; that said bonds were optional for payment by said City of O'Neill, Nebraska, on or before January 1, 1936.

Sec. 2. That for the purpose of raising \$12,000.00, necessary to pay off said issue and to refund same, that there shall be issued, and hereby is ordered to be issued \$12,000.00 worth of negotiable bonds of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, to be known as "City of O'Neill Refunding Bonds, Series C", in denominations of \$1,000.00 each to be dated April 1, 1936, to be payable to bearer, to be numbered one to twelve inclusive, to be due in 20 years from their date and to be optional for payment by the said City of O'Neill, as follows:

Bond Number 1 to be optional for payment 1 year from date. Bond Number 2 to be optional for payment 2 years from date. Bond Number 3 to be optional for payment 3 years from date. Bond Number 4 to be optional for payment 4 years from date. Bond Number 5 to be optional for payment 5 years from date. Bond Number 6 to be optional for payment 6 years from date. Bond Number 7 to be optional for payment 7 years from date. Bond Number 8 to be optional for payment 8 years from date. Bond Number 9 to be optional for payment 9 years from date. Bonds Numbered from 10 to 12 inclusive to be optional for payment 10 years from date.

THE NEBRASKA SCENE (Continued from page 4.) same place under protection of injunctions. Adams believes beer taverns may now handle package liquor in communities where only package sale of hard liquor is now legal, altho local authorities may put a crimp on such action in many towns.

The supreme court decision came as the result of inaccurate work by the last legislature which put conflicting sections into the liquor law. As a result of the ruling, local communities and schools stand to lose considerable revenue, as the \$150 package liquor license now will cover both beer and hard liquor, and for \$250 in sale-by-the-drink communities a license may be obtained to sell both beer and hard liquor by the drink.

STATE HOUSE SHORTS: Nebraska's 1937 automobile license plates are now being turned out at the men's reformatory at Lincoln at the rate of several thousand a day. The plates will be black symbols on a grey background, in direct contrast with the grey-on-black plates used this year. The reformatory will turn out about 560,000 pairs of plates at a manufacturing cost of 6 1/2 cents a pair.

The question of whether the \$1,113,000 collected under the voided relief acts taxing gasoline one cent per gallon shall be refunded and to whom has not yet been settled, altho the supreme court last week dismissed the last of the suits brought by oil dealers seeking to recover the fund now held aside in the treasury.

Federal receipts on March 25 for the fiscal year were \$3,035,727,926, which was an increase of 8 per cent
