and Douglas county, and one by which the county manager system of government might be placed in operation in Douglas county.

It is expected that the legislature will provide funds to light the state capitol tower for ornamental purposes as well as a safety precaution for night-flying airplanes.

A campaign for a state police broadcasting system is underway under the sponsorship of Nebraska law enforcement officers.

Ben M. Johnson, of Lincoln, has prepared a proposed bill for the unicameral legislature for a state civil service law copied much after the Wisconsin law.

The Nebraska Crop Growers' association will call to the legislators' attention a bill defining hybrid corn and prohibiting its sale under false premises.

A thorough overhauling of Nebraska's laws and ideas on law enforcement is advocated by Attorney General William H. Wright.

It is very likely that an existing state law prohibiting the smoking of cigarettes in public eating places will be repealed.

The lowest state tax levy in 15 years, or since the state board of equalization and assessment began to assess property at full value in 1921, has been set for 1936.

The estimated total running expenses of the state government for the next fiscal year is \$3,635,771. This is \$738,067 less than the 1935 figure.

Savings out of the 1935 legislative appropriations which Governor Cochran will make in his departments or will be realized by agreement between the governor and the board of control total \$104,000.

For the first time since 1921 an increase appears in the total tangible property assessment of the state as reported to the state tax commission by county clerk's and assessors.

The turn which has finally taken place in the long cycle of decreasing property values in Nebraska not only boosts this year's assessment \$30,000,000 above that of 1935 but also tops the 1934 total by a few hundred thousand.

Tough sledding apparently is ahead for Nebraska's proposed farm-labor party, which failed to gain official recognition at a recent state convention at Lincoln.
