

The Use Highways

Pedestrians

ZEEP TO THE RIGHT is a rule which does not apply to the pedestrian using the highways. When walking along a highway or road, always stay on the left side, so as to face oncoming traffic. The person who walks on the right with vehicular traffic must constantly look to the rear to see if a car is approaching. As the man, No. 3, in the above illustration, he cannot see car No. 1 and if it is making very little noise he will not hear it. This is doubly dangerous at night, as a pedestrian cannot be easily seen by a driver when he

is facing the lights of cars coming from the opposite direction. Walk as pedestrian No. 4 in the illustration. He is facing vehicle No. 2, and can easily see how much room he must give to avoid the danger of accident. The person who walks with traffic on the right side of a highway places his life in great danger, as well as the lives of those in automobiles, as striking a person could easily cause a car to be turned over, inflicting serious injury or even death to its occupants. If you must walk on a public road, KEEP TO THE LEFT!
