Pot Roast

3 pounds of rump, chuck or shoulder; one-third cup suet, ½ cup hot water, salt and pepper and

Rub the meat with flour, salt and pper. Melt the suet in a heavy cettle or dutch oven. Add meat. Add water. Cover tightly. Cook slowly about 4 hours or until tender. More water may be used if necessary. This will serve eight people nicely.

The upper portion of the aitchbone is solid meat, good quality. Use it as a roast, braised or stewed The upper portion of the round is fairly tender. Use the round as roast, pot roast or steak.

Braised Beef 3 pounds chuck, round or shoulder, one-third cup suet, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 2 cups diced potatoes, 1/2 cup boiling water, salt and pepper, 3 cups diced carrots, 1 cup cooked tomatoes and flour.

Rub the meat with salt, pepper and flour. Melt suet in neavy kettle. Add meat. Sear. Add water. W. A. S. Cover. Cook slowly until the meat is tender. Add vegetables. Cook until tender. This will serve eight

The brisket may be either fat or lean meat of coarse quality. Use it boiled, stewed, in soups, corned or as pot roast.

Steaked Spaghetti 1/4 pound cheese, grated; 1 large onion, chopped; 1 pound round steak, have your butcher grind it. 11/2 cups tomato saup, 2 cups chopped green peppers, 2 cups cooked spaghetti or macaroni. Salt and

Combine the cheese, onion, soup, steak, peppers, and spaghetti or macaroni. Season to taste. Mix thoroughly. Pour into a baking dish. Bake in moderate oven of 375 degrees for about 45 minutes. Serves six.




