Views of Congress By Dr. A. L. Miller, M. C. Second Session, 28th Congress Opens.

The second session of the 78th Congress convened on January 10. This is a week later than it would normally have opened but the lateness of the adjournment of the members from the west coast had to travel and the uncertainties of travel conditions made it advisable to set the opening date a week later.

Important Bills on Calendars. Several very important bills are before one or both of the Houses. Among the most important are the following: The Revenue Bill. A revenue bill has been passed by the House and a similar bill with some differences is before the Senate.

Aviation. The most widely known of the bills to codify the aviation law is the Lea Bill, but two other bills, one by Reece (Tenn.) and the other by Bulwinkle (N. C.), presenting contrasting proposals has resulted in somewhat of a confusion.
