SPICY RAISIN PIE

Mother's Best Pastry
 1 1/2 cups Mother's Best Flour
 1/4 cup cold water
 1/4 cup shortening
 1/2 teaspoon salt

Sift Mother's Best, measure and sift with salt. Cut in shortening until mixture looks like meal. Work water in lightly with knife or spatula until little balls of dough are about the size of beans, and just hang together in one large ball. Turn 1/2 the pastry into lightly floured board. Roll in sheet 1/8 inch thick. Shape pastry to fit pie pan. Roll remainder for top crust, pastry strips, or for over second crust.

1 egg well beaten
 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 1/2 cup sour milk or 1/4 cup milk or 1/4 cup buttermilk
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon cloves

Combine first seven ingredients and beat well. Add molasses, milk, raisins. Line 9 inch pie plate with pastry. Pour in filling. Add for crust. Bake in hot oven (450 F.) 15 minutes, then decrease heat to moderate (350 F.) and bake about 30 minutes.
