To assure state-wide representation on the Board of Directors of Consumers Public Power District, the Nebraska Legislature, in 1943, passed legislation providing that Directors shall be elected, one each, from the seven designated election Districts. In accordance with provisions of this act, Directors of Consumers Public Power District will be nominated in the April, 1944 primaries for the following Districts: District No. 1 (two year term); District No. 2 (six year term); District No. 6 (six year term) and District No. 7 (four year torm).

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
