- 1 cup milk
- 1 to 1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped left-over meat
- 2 teaspoons minced onion
- 1/4 cup grated carrot
- 2 tablespoons melted shortening
- 2 stiff beaten egg whites

Stir dry ingredients. Mix egg yolks and milk; add to flour mixture; stir. Add meat, onion, carrot, and shortening. Fold in egg whites. Pour into greased 1-quart baking dish. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees) about 45 minutes. Serve with hot gravy.
