**The Policy of Your Consumers Public Power District Pertaining To Employment With The District**

Reprinted from the Employee Relationship Policy of Consumers Public Power District published January 11, 1944.

"No employee of the District and no one seeking employment shall be required as a condition of employment, transfer, promotion or retention in service to join or to refrain from joining any organization or association of employees."

"There shall be no discrimination against representation of employees of the District nor shall employees suffer discrimination because of membership or non-membership in any organization or association of employees."

Your Consumers Public Power District is a public agency in every respect — owned by the people of Nebraska and operated for their benefit. Any agreement which affects the finances of the District or its operation directly affects the people of Nebraska who use the electric service provided by the District.

Fully recognizing their responsibilities as duly elected representatives of the people and the duties vested in them by the law under which the District operates, the Directors and Management of your Consumers Public Power District have acted according to their best judgment in the interests of the people of Nebraska in the recent strike negotiations.

It is the policy of the District to pay its employees the best wages possible consistent with earnings of the District. Since Pearl Harbor, wage increases averaging over 20% have been granted to employees. An additional 7½ cents hourly increase, an average of about \$15.00 per month, has been granted for all operating employees, union and non-union, and arrangements for consideration of other employees have been made.

The District acted in good faith in its attempts to negotiate with the union but it became apparent that their demands were impossible to meet. The electric service to Nebraska's homes, industries, farms and war projects is far too important to be interrupted by a controversy in which there appeared to be no possibility of an acceptable settlement, therefore, negotiations were dropped. A large majority of the employees have returned voluntarily to their jobs and we are assured that others will follow. The employees are a vital part of your Consumers Public Power District and the communities they serve. We have every confidence in them and are happy to see them resume their places in the important job of supplying dependable electric service for Nebraska.
