Farm Machinery Shortages: In a speech before the House on May 19th Congressman Bennett, republican from Missouri, mentioned some things that may ac-count for the shortage of farm machinery. He first quoted from a report of the Federal Trade Commission issued in 1938 which Commission issued in 1938 which said that the two largest manu-facturers of farm machinery in 1936 sold 74½% of all the farm machinery sold that year. He then said, "I find upon investi-gation, that the Farm Machinery and Equipment Division of the War Production Board is in com-plete control of the representa-tives of the two companies charged in the Federal Trade Commission report with monolis-


