Miss Darlene Mindenhall of Valentine, came Wednesday to visit Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Simonson until Saturday.

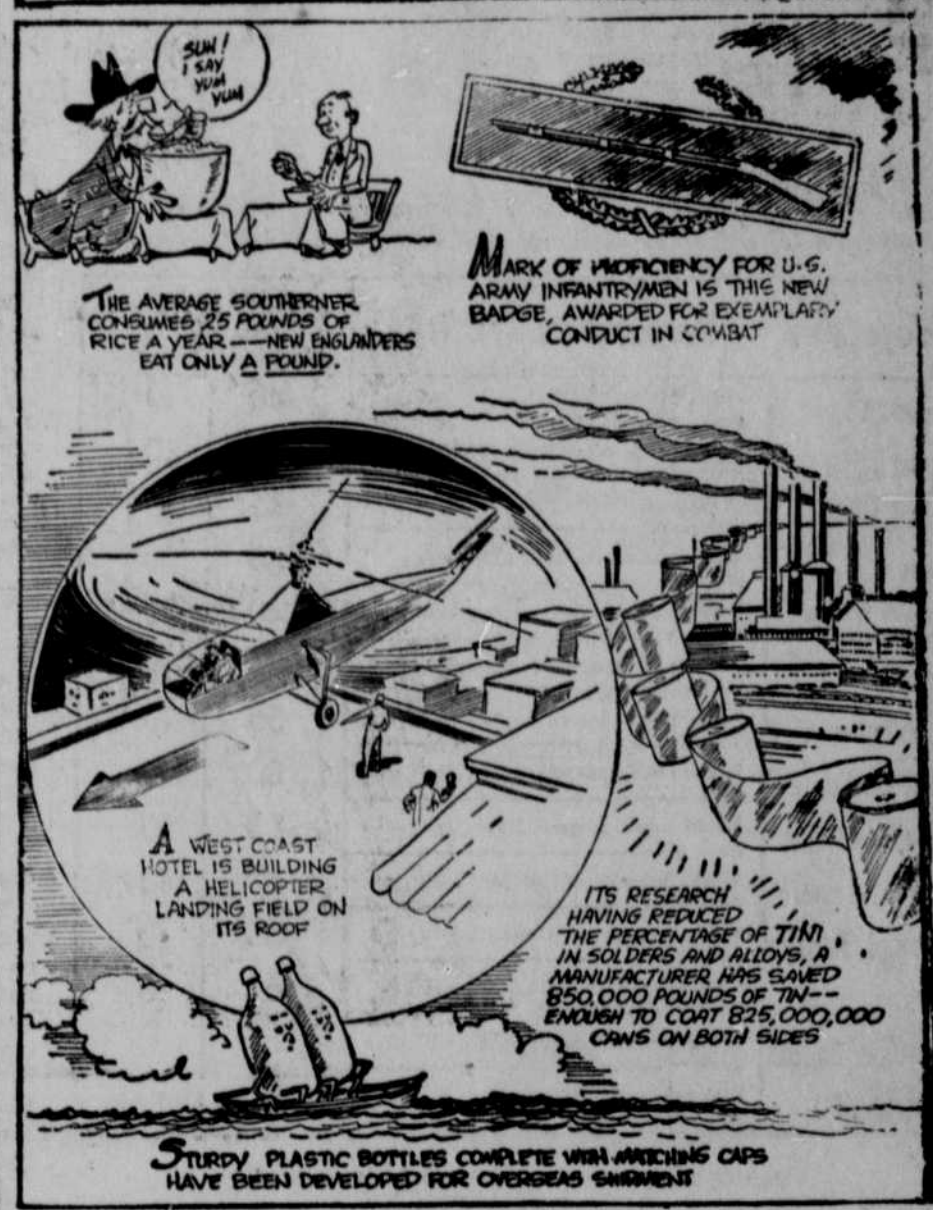

Army Air Combat Crew Reopened By AAF
 The Army Air Forces air combat crew training program has been reopened by the war department to 17-year-old youths. Maj. Frank V. Kent, commanding officer, Nebraska Recruiting district, Omaha, announced the first of the week.

Suspended since last March, applications again are being received by the Omaha AAF Examining Board and 17-year-old youths are being enlisted in the Army Air Forces Enlisted Reserve for the air combat crew training after reaching their 18th birthday it was explained.

Several hundred applications were pending in the Omaha office and at examining boards throughout the Nebraska district (the states of Nebraska and South Dakota) when the order halting

enlistments temporarily was re-issued. Major Kent urged all youths, still 17, who had applied for the training to again write or visit the Omaha AAF Examining Board, 225 Post Office Building, Omaha, to complete their enlistment.

Youths enlisting who are under 17 years and nine months old on June 1 and who are high school graduates will be offered the opportunity to attend college under the Army Specialized Reserve Training Program at government expense before their call for active training with the Army Air Forces, it was explained.

Applicants must pass a mental and physical combat crew qualifying examination to be accepted by the examining board and the 17-year-olds must have consent of parents or guardian on their application. Men 18 to 28 are not being accepted for the training as was the case previous to the enlistment suspension.

When called to active duty, men with outstandingly high aptitude ratings will be given training for pilot, bombardier and navigator's positions, cian gunners, armorers gunners, or airplane mechanic gunners, officers of the Omaha board explained.
