**Old Time Resident of Page Passes Away in Missouri**

Orman Beecher was born in Monmouth, Ill., August 26, 1864, and died at the home of his son, Royal, near Fulton, Mo., June 30, 1944, at the age of 79 years, 10 months and 4 days.

He was married February 2, 1899, at Hartington, Neb., to Minnie Bartz, who preceded him in death 21 years ago. Four children were born to this union, all of whom survive.

The following are left to mourn his passing: Three sons, Clarence of Hartington; Royal of Fulton, Mo.; Merle of Columbus, Mo.; one daughter, Mrs. John Roller of Mokane, Mo. Two sisters, Mrs. Lula Freeborn, Lilydale, N. Y.; and Mrs. Walter Wright of Beatrice, Neb. Six grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Mr. Beecher came to Page in 1905 and left here in 1918. He was a carpenter and constructed many of the buildings around Page.

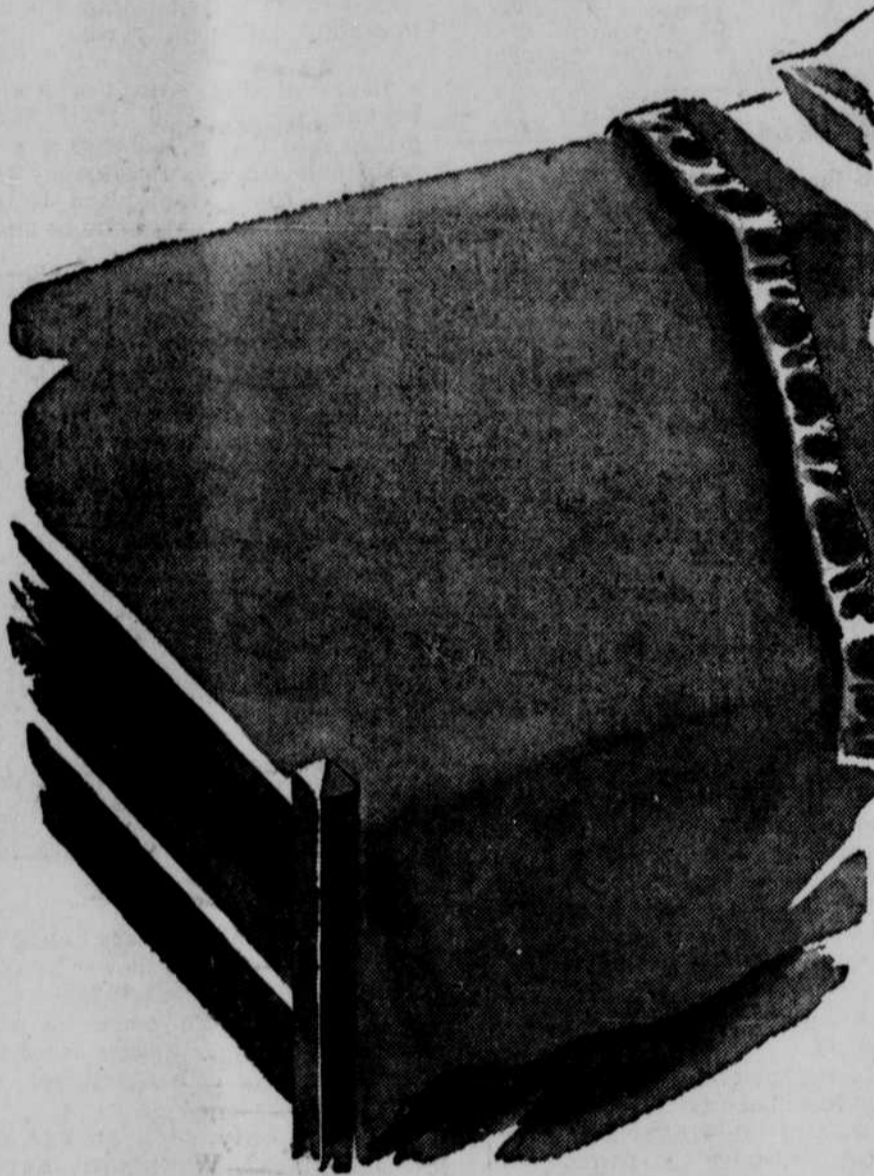

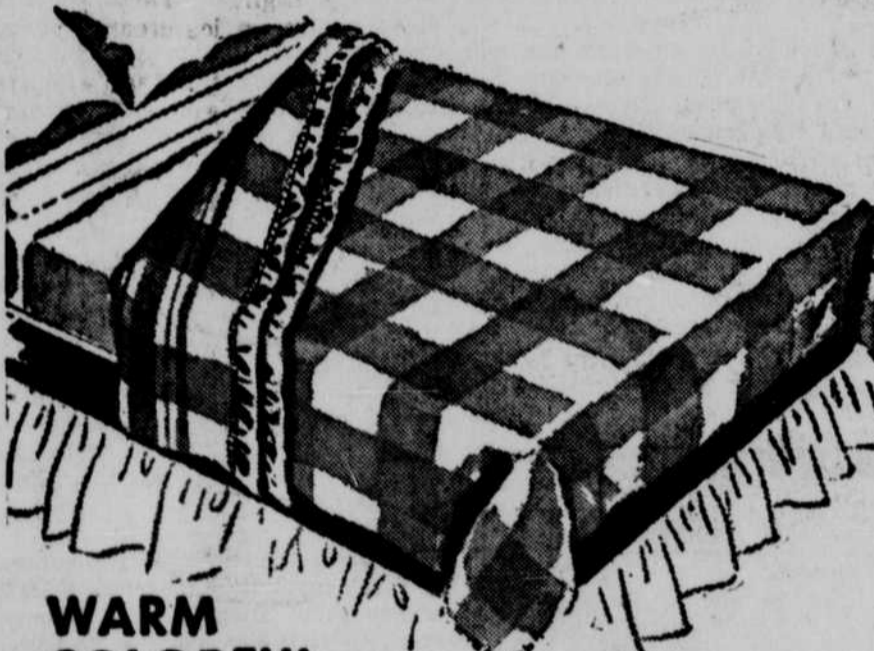

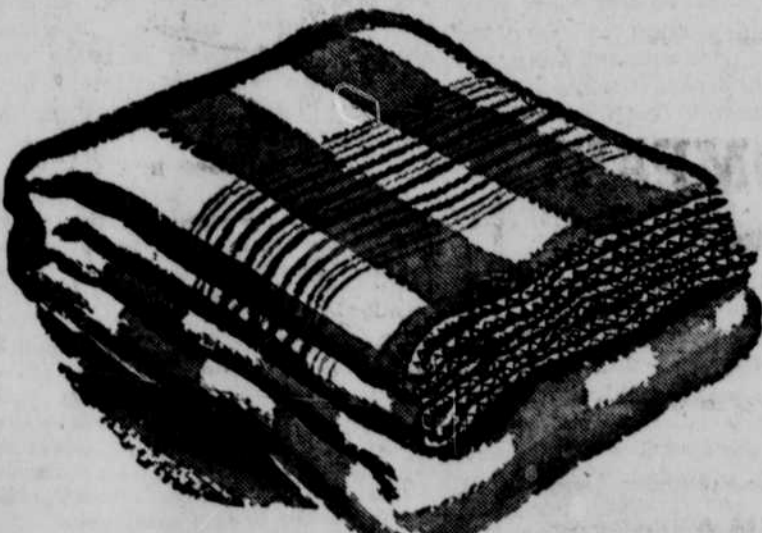
