DIGESTIVE TROUBLES CAUSE SWINE LOSS

Hog producers may have to pay an increasing penalty this year for the high-speed pork production they are trying to obtain to meet war food goals. Crowding a hog's digestive system for fast gains places a heavy strain on it—and makes it a more easy victim of the digestive disorders which are all too common in our hog lots right now.

The most serious of these digestive troubles of swine, and one most likely to be a greater problem this season, is Enteritis. This disease generally begins with scouring, reduced appetite, and a rise in the hog's temperature. After a time, the pigs may appear to return to normal, but they fail to show proper gains, remain unthrifty, and in some cases they become so debilitated that they finally die.

There are two bad complications that show symptoms of enteritis. These two conditions are recognized as the serious digestive disorders—dysentery and scours, and unless a veterinary diagnosis is obtained early in the course of the disease, the owner may be trying to combat the wrong disease entirely, and lose a number of hogs as a result of this. A second danger is the fact that some symptoms

of enteritis resemble hog cholera, and the owner may try to vaccinate

his hogs against cholera with disastrous results.

No known medicine has yet been approved as a specific treatment for all types of enteritis. Most authorities recommend preventive action, and a thorough program to eliminate the disease from the farm. Steps in this direction include raising pigs in clean houses, on clean pasture, and keeping them away from old lots which may have been contaminated by previous generations of enteritis hogs. New pigs should not be brought onto the farm without first being checked for this disease. The right type of ration will also help to hold down the trouble. In hogs already affected
