

# Standardization By **Population Groups**

In order that electric users in communities of comparable population groups throughout the state may enjoy the same low rates, towns served at retail by Consumers Public Power District have been grouped by population classifications following Federal Power Commission groupings.



### 10% AVERAGE OVERALL **REDUCTIONS**

Average overall reductions throughout the state-wide system will amount to approximately 10%. However, since this reduction is designed primarily as a standardization measure, which will make available the same low rates for customers in towns in comparable population groups, percentages of reduction will vary somewhat. Many different rates were in effect in the various towns at the time the proper-

ties were purchased by Consumers and although, through previous reductions, rates have been somewhat equalized, wide variations still exist in some areas. Therefore, in order to apply the new rates uniformly, some towns, where higher rates exist, will receive larger reductions than towns where relatively lower rates are already in effect. The standard rate schedules, however, will enable towns in the various classifications to benefit alike from future reductions made in the respective groups.
