MEMORIAL IS OBSERVED FOR PAGE SOLDIER

Memorial services were held in the Page school auditorium Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Bernard Bohn who died from wounds received in the invasion of France. American Legion Posts of Page and O'Neill assisted at the services.
 The colors were advanced and retired by four veterans of World War II, who have received honorable discharges. They are: Charles Sorenson, Oliver Szama, Harold Dorr and Lloyd Snyder. The sermon was delivered by Rev. P. J. Griffiths, World war veteran, of Salem, Oregon. The national anthem and favorite hymns of the family were sung by a double quartette, Mesdames Evelyn Gray, C. E. Walker, Ray Snell, H. L. DeLancey, V. E. Hunter, O. B. Stuart, William Clark and Allen Haynes with Miss Jean Wood at the piano.
 Bernard Edward Bolin was born December 4, 1924, near Middlebranch, Nebr. When he was six years of age his parents moved to a farm near Page. He received most of his education in the Page school, graduating from the twelfth grade at Page in May, 1943. He took an active part in all athletics while attending school. He attended the Methodist Sunday School throughout his early years.
 His family moved to Lincoln in December, 1942. He made his home with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Edmisten from that time until his graduation. On June 21 he went to Omaha for preinduction examination and reported to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, July 5. Most of his training was received at Fort McClellan, Alabama. He spent a five day furlough with his parents while he was enroute from that camp to Fort Mead, Maryland.

He was sent to England the latter part of December. He took part in the invasion of France and was seriously wounded in Normandy June 15. He died two days later, June 17, at the age of 19 years, six months and thirteen days.
 Surviving are his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Bolin, Lincoln; five sisters, Alice, WAC; Betty, Carlene, Ura and Marian, all at home; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Edmisten, Middlebranch, and Mrs. Stella Bolin, Panama. One sister and one brother preceded him in death.

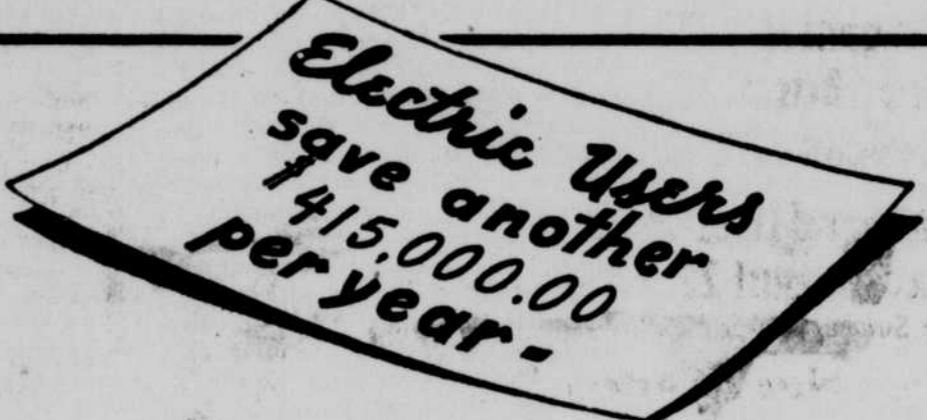

STATE-WIDE STANDARDIZATION BRINGS ANOTHER BIG CUT IN ELECTRIC RATES

EFFECTIVE WITH METER READINGS ON AND AFTER SEPT. 5



Standardization By Population Groups

In order that electric users in communities of comparable population groups throughout the state may enjoy the same low rates, towns served at retail by Consumers Public Power District have been grouped by population classifications following Federal Power Commission groupings.

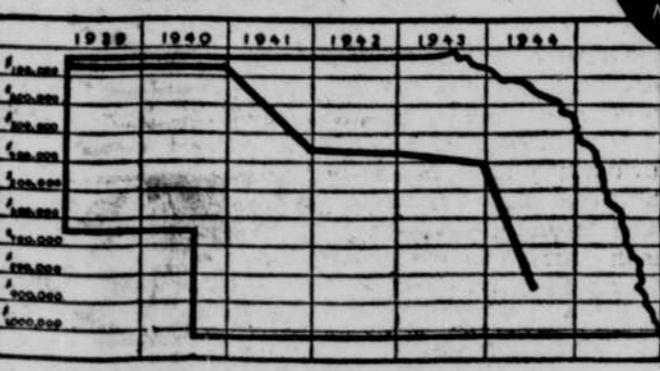
RATE GROUPS WILL BE AS FOLLOWS—

- Group 1 Cities of over 10,000 population (except metropolitan areas)
- Group 2 Cities with populations of 2,500 to 10,000
- Group 3 Towns of 1,000 to 2,500 population
- Group 4 Towns with less than 1,000 population
- Group 5 Rural customers.

10% AVERAGE OVERALL REDUCTIONS

Average overall reductions throughout the state-wide system will amount to approximately 10%. However, since this reduction is designed primarily as a standardization measure, which will make available the same low rates for customers in towns in comparable population groups, percentages of reduction will vary somewhat. Many different rates were in effect in the various towns at the time the properties were purchased by Consumers and although, through previous reductions, rates have been somewhat equalized, wide variations still exist in some areas. Therefore, in order to apply the new rates uniformly, some towns, where higher rates exist, will receive larger reductions than towns where relatively lower rates are already in effect. The standard rate schedules, however, will enable towns in the various classifications to benefit alike from future reductions made in the respective groups.
