Co-operation Urged
The committee expressed belief the best interests of Nebraska friendly co-operation between all public agencies, the hydro, Contraction districts and the legislature.

Regarding Consumers the report observed "in most instances more was paid for the property purchased than could be justified on the basis of cost of reproduction, value of property less depreciation."

"Despite this fact and despite the further fact that expensive financing, the report stated, "Consumer" has been able to meet all its obligations and to effect a very substantial reduction in rates.

"The present obligations bear interest at 7 per cent, whereas most of the securities of the predecessor company paid 5 to 7 per cent," the report pointed out concluding that "even critics of the district admit that its operation has benefited users of electricity."

Tip to Consumers
Rapping efforts of some cities to pull out of the district by condemnation proceedings, the committee urged:
"Consumers is now a successful going concern and shows every prospect of retiring its bonds on schedule."
"The subcommittee believes it will be a benefit to the state if the district is permitted to operate in least until the bulk of the bonds have been paid. . . . It hopes the interests are fully protected while resort to condemnation will not be resorted to."
