
Tribesmen Build Road Through West China

Veteran Seventh Army Carries on Grim Struggle





Clare Luce Dunks




While visiting G.1.s in Europe, Rep. Clare Boothe Luce of Connecticut, showed the troops that she knew ing, learned in Washington.
