## Mrs. R. Saunders Dies In Lincoln Last Friday; Burial Here Monday

Following an illness of nearly three months, Mrs. Romaine Saunders, whose home was in Swan precinct, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harold Eno, in Lincoln, Nebraska, at 2:00 a. m. Friday, February 16. Her husband, daughter, Mrs. E. T. Lindholm, and Mrs. Eno and family were with her at the time of her death.

Funeral services were held in Lincoln Saturday, February 18, and the body shipped to O'Neill for burial in the family plot in Prospect Hill.

Rosa Ethel, eldest of six children of George W. and Maria A. Meals, was born in Sullivan county, Missouri, December 4, 1875. In her early childhood the family moved to Fort Scott, Kansas, and in 1885 came to the then frontier town of Atkinson, engaging in the hotel business in what is now the Stockman Hotel. A few years later they took up residence in O'Neill.

After attendance at the O'Neill public schools, Rosa took up the work of a compositor on the old O'Neill Sun, continuing as such through most of the life of that publication by C. C. McHugh. In 1897 the family moved to California, Miss Rosa remaining in O'Neill for a time and then entering Union College at College View, now a part of Lincoln.

On April 18, 1898, she was united in marriage with Romaine Saunders, their home for a time being at Leigh, Neb., where they published the Leigh World. O'Neill having been the former home of each, they established their permanent residence there among old friends. Nebraska had been the home of the deceased continuously for sixty years except one year in California. After some years residence in O'Neill she went with her husband and family to a ranch 27 miles south of town, and from there in 1915 moved to Lincoln for educational advantages. In 1930 she returned with the family to Holt county where their home has since been in Swan precinct.

Mrs. Saunders is survived by her husband; four daughters, Mrs. L. M. Rohrer of Glendale, Calif., Mrs. Harold Eno of Orlandia, Fla., Mrs. Edwin T. Lindholm of Seattle, Wash.; three sons, Glenn of East Greenwich, R. I., Ned of Grand Island, Neb., and Romaine, Jr. U. S. Coast Guard Base, Wilmington, Calif. She is also survived by one sister, Mrs. E. Meals of Santa Barbara, Calif., and three brothers, Lt. Col. C. A. Meals, retired, of Auburn, Calif., W. E. Meals down in Cuba, and Albert Meals of Compton, Calif.; George Meals of Atkinson, a cousin; also five grandchildren.

It is recorded of the parents of John that they were "both righteous before God, walking in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord blameless." Of few can this be said. After nearly 47 years of home life with a thorough lady may be permitted to testify that this scripture meets another fulfillment in the life of Rosa.

## Livestock Run Some Lighter Here Monday Due To Cold

About 300 head of fat hogs and feeder shoats were sold. All fat hogs sold at the ceiling, which was \$14.10; heavy feeders sold at \$14.25 to \$15.00 per hundred.

**Meats, Fats, Etc.**  
Book four red stamps Q5 through S5 are good through Mar. 31. Stamps T5 through X5 will be good through April 28. Stamps Y5, Z5, and A2 through D2 are good through June 2.

**Processed Foods**  
Book four blue stamps X5 through Z5 and A2 and B2 good through May 31. Stamps C2 through G2 are good through Apr. 28. Stamps H2 through M2 will be good through June 2.

**Sugar**  
Book four stamp 34 good for five pounds through February 28. Stamp 35 valid for five pounds through June 2. Another stamp scheduled to be validated May 1.

**Shoes**  
Book three airplane stamps 1, 2, and 3 valid indefinitely; OPA says no plans to cancel any.

**Gasoline**  
14-A coupons good everywhere for four gallons through March 21. B-5, C-5, and C-6 coupons good everywhere for five gallons.

**Fuel Oil**  
Last year's period four and five coupons and this year's period one, two, three and four coupons good in all sizes. Period five coupons valid in midwest and south. All coupons valid throughout current heating season.

## Lt. Hugh F. McKenna Now Stationed At Kansas Field

Strother Field, Kansas, February 15—Among the new officer arrivals at this 72nd Fighter Wing base of the Second Air Force is First Lieutenant Hugh F. McKenna, Quartermaster Corps, 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. McKenna of O'Neill, Nebraska. Lt. McKenna, whose home is at 1609 South Twenty-third Street, Lincoln, reported here from Harding Field, Louisiana.

Lt. McKenna enlisted in the service December 23, 1940. He was promoted to his present rank April 15, 1943.

At Strother Field he will administer supply functions vital to the fighter pilot training program.

## S-Sgt. Frank Dietsch Is Wounded In Philippines; Loses His Left Forearm

Anton Dietsch received a letter from his brother S/Sgt. Frank J. Dietsch, dated February 3rd and received Monday, in which he stated that he had been wounded in the Philippine campaign, and although the doctors had worked on his left forearm for hours, they were unable to save it and had to be amputated just above the elbow.

He said he was feeling fine and was up and around the second day and had shaved himself the day he wrote the letter. He said not to write as he was on his way to the United States.

Sgt. Dietsch left in March 1942 to join the services and was only in the states 14 weeks before he was shipped to the south Pacific. He has been at different islands, among which were Guadalcanal, New Georgia, New Caledonia and others.

The family here has not as yet received official notification from the war department.

## Lt. Robert J. Earley Of O'Neill Awarded Oak Leaf Cluster To His Air Medal

Air Transport Command Base, India—2nd Lt. Robert J. Earley, Pilot, of O'Neill, Nebraska, has been awarded an Oak Leaf Cluster to his Air Medal, it was announced by Brig. Gen. William H. Turner, commanding general of the India China Division, Air Transport Command.

The award was made upon completion of 450 hours of operational flight in transport aircraft over the dangerous and difficult India-China air routes, where enemy interception and attack was probable and expected.

The air trail over the Hump, flamed route through the towering peaks of the Himalaya Mountains, was flown by the Air Transport Command, is recognized by airmen as the world's toughest. Today the Hump route is the only lifeline of vital military supplies for the Allied forces fighting the Japanese in China.

The citation accompany the award adds:

"Flying at night as well as by day, at altitudes over impassable, mountainous terrain through areas characterized by extremely treacherous weather conditions necessitating long periods of operation on instruments... requiring courage and superior performance of his duties to overcome, he accomplished his mission with distinction..."

The award was made for the period of service from November 1, 1943 to July 13, 1944.

## Pfc. Robt. Ridgeway Killed In Action On Leyte January 13th

Mr. and Mrs. Ross Ridgeway have received the sad message from the War Department February 8, 1945 stating that their son, Pfc. Robert R. Ridgeway, was killed in action January 13, 1945.

Robert Ridgeway was born at Scottville, Nebraska May 9, 1915 and was killed in action January 13, 1945 on Leyte Island of the Philippine group at the age of 29 years, 8 months, and 4 days.

Robert was reared and spent most of his life in Holt County, with the exception of about two years of which he spent in the states of Montana and Wyoming.

Robert was inducted into the Army at Ft. Crook, Neb. October 6th, 1941. He was then transferred to Camp Roberts, Calif. for basic infantry training. He was also stationed at various other posts in California, which included San Luis Obispo, Pericedo, Indio, and Fort Ord.

Robert spent two furloughs with his parents at Scottville, the first one while stationed at Camp Roberts, and the last while at Fort Ord, Calif.

He departed from Ft. Ord, Calif. in April, 1943 with the 17th Infantry, which then invaded the island of Attu. While serving in the Aleutian Islands his legs were severely frozen and he was sent to a hospital in Alaska. After six months he recovered and was then assigned to the 32nd Infantry, stationed in the Hawaiian Islands.

After a short time there he went with the 32nd Infantry in the invasion of the Marshall Islands and fought on Kwajalein Atoll. After clearing the island of enemy resistance he again returned to the Hawaiian Islands, where he was stationed, to make preparation for the invasion of the Philippines. Later in the invasion of the Philippines he landed on the island of Leyte.

The last word received from Robert was while he was on Leyte and no further word was had of him until the War Department notified his parents that he had been killed in action on that island January 13th.

He leaves to mourn his passing: his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Ridgeway; two sisters, Mrs. D. J. Sullivan of Grand Island, Neb., and Miss Margaret Ridgeway of Davenport, Iowa; and four brothers, Pvt. George Wilford Ridgeway in France, Vincent J. Ridgeway of North Platte, Neb., Charles W. Ridgeway, SF 2/c in the South Pacific, and Donald H. Ridgeway at home.

## Household Goods Subject To Price Ceilings When Sold By Auctioneers

There has been considerable misunderstanding among persons who sell their household goods as to whether ceiling prices apply to the individual or not, according to M. E. Rawlings, Sioux City District OPA Director. There are six articles of household goods which must not be sold for more than the ceiling price regardless of who the seller may be. These are used mechanical refrigerators, used gas cooking stoves, used washing machines, used vacuum cleaners, used bed springs and used typewriters.

All other articles of household goods are subject to price ceilings when sold by dealers or auctioneers. The only sales of household goods (other than the six articles mentioned above) exempt from price control are sales by individuals who purchased the article for their own use and where the sale is made privately, not at auction.
