M/Sgt. LuVerne O. Dorr Awarded Bronze Star Medal

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England — For "meritorious achievement" in connection with military operations in the European Theater of Operations Master Sergeant LuVerne O. Dorr, 22-year-old crew chief of an Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal which was presented by Colonel Charles B. Dougher of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., group commanding officer.

He is the son of Henry Dorr of Page, Nebraska. He was graduated from Page High School and was an auto mechanic at Tecumseh, Nebraska, before joining the Army in July, 1940. He was graduated from Chanute Field, Ill., mechanic's school.

The citation accompanying the award praised the sergeant's initiative, energy, and devotion to duty. Of the 118 missions his three aircraft to which he has been assigned, one at a time, he has sent them aloft 93 consecutive times without a mechanical failure developing and forcing the plane from its bomb run.

Sgt. Dorr is a member of the 94th Bomb. Group which was cited by the President for its historic bombing of the Muhlembau aircraft assembly plant at Brunswick, Germany. This group also participated in the Third Air Division England to Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt aircraft plants at Regensburg, Germany in August, 1943 for which the entire division was awarded a Presidential Citation.

### E. Donald Bowen With Navy Band Which Plays For Patients At Hospital

A Navy band which played for presidents of three Pan-American countries now is on duty entertaining patients and staff members at the Farragut Naval Hospital.

The unit band of 20 pieces was at sea 27 months before coming to Farragut. Directed by Chief Musician S. J. Swartz, of Richmond, Calif., a Navy bandsman for 16 years, the band was organized at the Navy's School of Music in Washington, D. C., in May, 1942.

Assigned to a light cruiser, the flagship of the southeast Pacific Fleet, the score of musicians frequently were called upon for performances at special events as well as their two daily concerts aboard ship.

Presidents of Panama, Chile and Peru were guests aboard the flagship at various times and were entertained by the bandsmen. They played for parades and for parties ashore at Lima, Peru, Valparaiso, Chile, at servicemen's centers, as well as at a Navy station at Balboa, Canal Zone.

A versatile group, the men played swing programs on the quarterdeck of the ship at noontime. Classical music dominated the evening concerts as a concession to the admiral, "a long-haired music" fan.

The aggregation was armed with a big library of popular tunes, but sometimes got behind on the current hit parade favorites.

"But the crew didn't know the current fads in the states and we could play 'Mairzy Doates' six months behind and they'd never know the difference," Chief Swartz said.

"Mostly, however, the boys went for good solid swing," he said.

Nearly all members of the band joined the Navy fresh out of high school and had little professional experience. They have developed into first-class musicians with the aid of the training at the Navy School of Music and the daily rehearsals aboard ship, Chief Swartz explained.

"Nevertheless, the music was secondary in the shipboard life," he pointed out.

The men were all detailed to battle stations, most of them taking part in first aid and damage repair parties. "And they had to swab the decks as well as cut a rug," he said.
