Woman Leads War Against Parasites
Hopes to Find Why Fungi Damages Machinery.
 SCHENECTADY, N. Y.—The only woman biologist doing research work at the General Electric company scientific fungus farm has selected Japanese names for the soggy fungi which so devastatingly impair the striking power of American war equipment in humid and tropical areas, says the United Press.
 Pointing to a greenish mold clustering around an insulated wire in a glass test dish, Miss Ruth Wyant, 25 years old, says "Tojos."
 Working with many other research scientists to render the parasites harmless, Miss Wyant says: "These fungus Tojos and all their many parasitic kin are a menace to delicate equipment. Colonies of them sometimes clog machinery. Some of them give off acids strong enough to damage metallic and electrical devices, particularly in such hot and muggy areas as our armed forces are operating in against the Japanese."
 Miss Wyant makes from 50 to 100 tests a day to determine exactly how the parasitic growths affect insulated wire, coils, switches and other electrical equipment under varied temperatures and atmospheric conditions.
 Always hoping to find an answer to the damage done to war equipment by this virtually microscopic enemy, Miss Wyant says "every test is different from the others. Each is liable to produce something new."
 Much information about fungus already has been obtained in her hundreds of tests but, as she points out, "Scientists here at GE and elsewhere are making advances in this important research. Several fungicidal varnishes, waxes and lacquers have been developed, which in the over-all reduce the depredations of the fungi greatly. However, the complete and perfect answer for fungus control under all conditions has not yet been found."
 Miss Wyant finds her work "vitaly interesting" and a relatively new field.

No Deaths for Cowardice Given Yanks in France
 PARIS, FRANCE.—Since D-day not a single American soldier in France has been executed for cowardice, desertion in the face of the enemy or any other military offense for which death is mandatory, it was disclosed here. This is a record believed to be unparalleled in modern war and for a theater where hundreds of thousands of troops are under arms. The records show only 16 instances of capital punishment in which final action has been taken. Four were for murder and 12 for rape.

Noiseless Transport Is Developed by Russians
 MOSCOW.—Tass announced the invention of a new noiseless transport operating on a high frequency current without a trolley, rails or storage batteries.
 One such vehicle has operated successfully for a year in a Moscow machine factory, pulling a one-ton load along a roadway underlain with high frequency wires, the official Soviet news agency said.
 (From this description, it appeared the vehicle was equipped with some kind of an induction motor.)

Holt County Ranchers And Farmers Plant Lots Of Trees; 12,000 Ordered
 Farmers and ranchers in Holt County know the value of trees as windbreaks, shelterbelts, and for soil conservation. County Agent Dawes reports that approximately 12,000 Clarke-McNary seedlings have been ordered through his office.
 Any farmer or rancher wanting these fine trees is urged to order now before the supply is gone. The price is \$1.25 for 100 trees. Application blanks may be obtained at County Agent's office, AAA office, or SCS office.
 Mr. Ressel, Chairman of AAA, states that payment for tree planting is again available in 1945—not only that but it is possible to earn payment for taking care of trees that were planted in past years. This is of interest to many. People who are interested in cooperating with the Holt County Soil Conservation Service and want trees for shelterbelt and windbreak purposes may obtain trees through their office.
 The SCS office has a tree planting machine available when large plantings are to be made. Along with the machine will be a tractor and two men. The District Supervisors have set up a schedule of prices for the trees and use of equipment. For further information contact the county agent, AAA

Boyd And Holt Counties Open For FO Loans
 Boyd and Holt Counties are now included in the farm ownership loan program under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act as administered by the Farm Security Administration. Ray L. Verzal, county supervisor, announced this week. This program has been in effect in an increasing number of Nebraska counties since 1938, and the number of counties designated in the state is now 43. Each state receives allocations from loan funds authorized by Congress, on a basis of population and prevalence of farm tenancy, Verzal explained. Eligible borrowers are farm tenant families who can not obtain adequate credit from other sources, but who are known to be thrifty and farm experienced. Farm laborers and sharecroppers also come under the eligibility clause of the Act and the recently enacted "GI Bill of Rights" extends eligibility to include veterans of World War II.

The local county FSA committee of three farmers review all applications for loans, as well as all offers of farms for sale within the county, and make final determination as to the farm ownership (FO) loans may be made. It is the strict policy of Farm Security to approve only loans which will "work out" on the price to be paid for the farm and improvements. Long-time earning capacity of the land is a deciding factor, and present abnormal prices are not allowed to determine the price to be paid for land involved in a purchase with FSA-administered farm ownership funds. FSA has thus held the line against inflated land prices, Verzal said.
 Loans are for 40 years time at 3% interest, but a fixed payment schedule is not adhered to at present. Instead, a "variable payment plan" is used, whereby the family repays according to the farm's annual net earnings. This means that in years of good prices and good yields, purchasers are asked to pay ahead of what the fixed schedule would be; and in bad years, the net earnings that could be applied to repayments would probably be less than the fixed schedule. Many FO borrowers have paid three or four years in advance, and 26 have already paid in full and own their farms. More than 500 FO loans have been made in Nebraska.
 Only family-type loans are considered, meaning farms that can be operated by the family's own labor except in peak periods such as harvest time. It also means that the farm is large enough to occupy the family's full time. Diversified farming is stressed, and farm records are kept. The FSA supervisor is available to help with farm and home planning, just as in the case of farmers with FSA rehabilitation loans.
