





#### **Boyd And Holt Counties Open For FO Loans**

Boyd and Holt Counties are now included in the farm ownership loan program under the Bankhead Jones Farm Tenant Act as administered by the Farm Security Ad-41-4 First publication Feb. 22, 1945 how the parasitic growths affect in- ministration, Ray L. Verzal, county supervisor, announced this week This program has been in effect in an increasing number of Ne braska counties since 1938, and the number of counties designated in the state is now 43. Each state receives allocations from loan funds authorized by Congress, on a basis of population and prevalence of farm tenancy, Verzal explained: Eligible borrowers are farm tenant families who can not obtain adequate credit from other sources, but who are known to be thrifty and farm experienced. Farm laborers and sharecroppers also come under the eligibility clause of the Trust Company, of Davenport, and elsewhere are making ad-Iowa, filed their petition in this vances in this important research. The local county FSA committee of three farmers review all applications for loans, as well as all offers of farms for sale within the county, and make final determination as to whom the farm ownership (FO) loans may be made. It is the strict policy of Farm Security to approve only loans which 'work out" on the price to be paid for the farm and improvements. Long-time earning capacity of the land is a deciding factor. and present abornmal prices are not allowed to determine the price to be paid for land involved in a purchase with FSA-administered arm ownership funds. FSA has thus held the line against inflated land prices, Verzal said.

Loans are for 40 years time at for which death is mandatory, it 3% interest, but a fixed payment schedule is not adhered to at present. Instead, a "variable payment plan" is used, whereby the family repays according to the farm's an-nual net earnings. This means that in years of good prices and good in years of good prices and good yields, purchasers ars asked to pay ahead of what the fixed schedule would be; and in bad years, the net earnings that could be applied to repayments would probably be less than the fixed schedule. Many FO borrowers have paid three or four years in advance, and 26 have already paid in full and own their farms. More than 500 FO loans have been made in Nebraska. Only family-type loans are con-

Only family-type loans are con-sidered, meaning farms that can be operated by the family's own labor except in peak periods such as harvest time. It also means that the farm is large enough to occupy the family's full time. Diversified farming is stressed, and farm rec-ords are kept. The FSA super-visor is available to help with farm and home planning, just as in the case of farmers with FSA rehabilitation loans.
