Old-Time Spice Chest

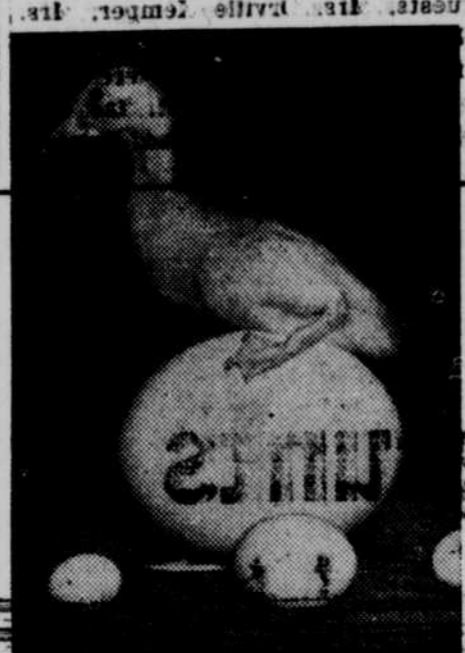

So Big—U.S. Push



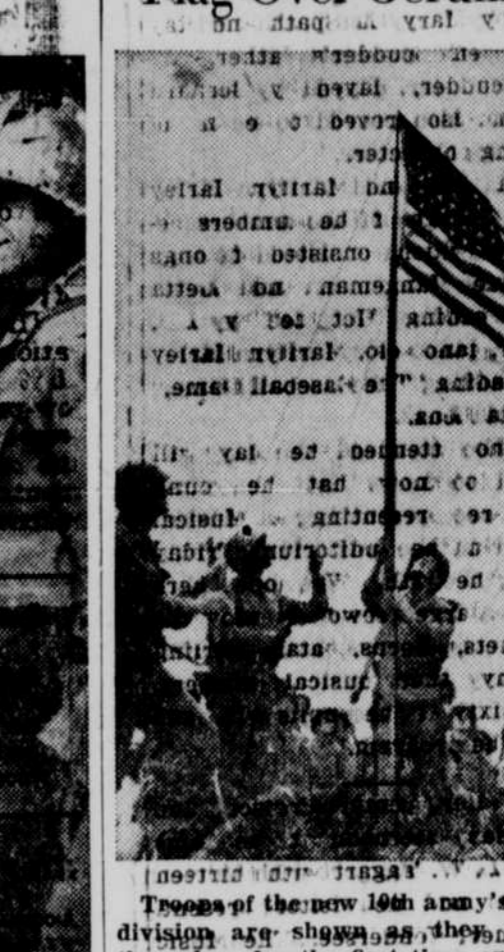

Flag Over Geruma



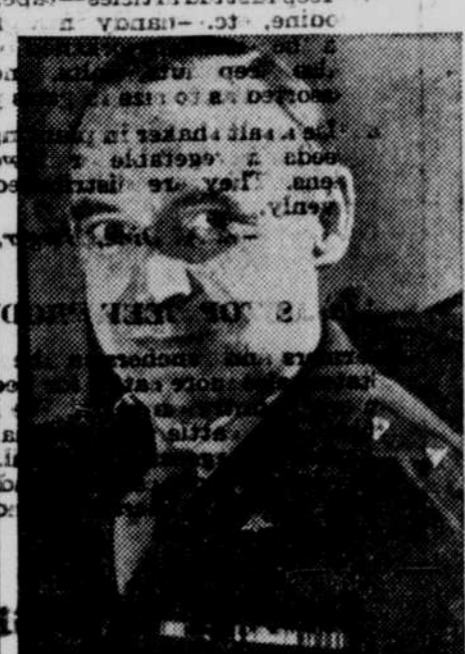

Watermelon for Iwo Warriors



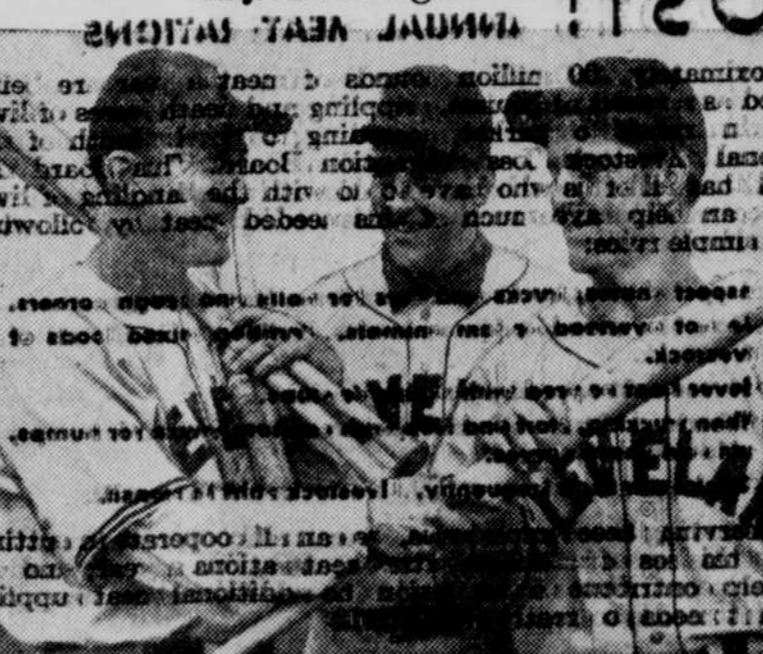

Nazi's Future Boss



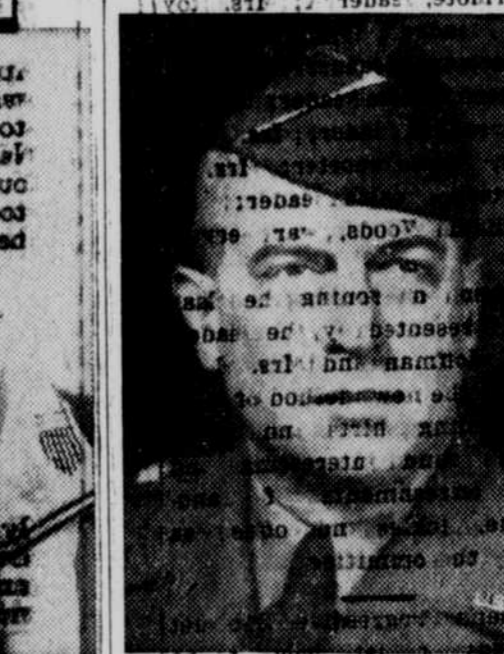

SNAPPY FACTS ABOUT RUBBER

Recent government tests demonstrated that synthetic truck tires show longer wear and less road cracking when operating at night than during daytime service. Atmospheric temperatures have given rise to seasonal differences in service. Like other rubber commodities, footwear should be treated properly to extend serviceability. Avoid tearing by putting on and removing rubber footwear carefully, wash outer surfaces after each wearing, dry out before storing, store in cool, dry, dark place and make sure to keep footwear from folds or wrinkles.
