



Okinawa Invasion Gigantic Military Operation





Call by Radio for Surrender





Old-Time Spice Chest

For Today's Kitchen



inches high and the drawers are planned to hold the shaker cans that spices come in today.

This chest is easy to make from scraps of lumber with plywood back shaped in simple curves that may be cut with a coping saw. The drawer fronts are made with a block back construction which requires no special tools. Plastic or brass knobs are used, and labels are pasted on and then slacked.
