Expcting Lots Of Returning Veterans
 Influx of veterans from Europe under the Army point system, this week brought a new call for help from Veterans Administration facilities throughout Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska and the Dakotas.

Federal civil service is seeking attorneys to act as adjudicators of veteran claims. Places of employment are at VA facilities throughout the five states of the eighth civil service region. Applicants must have been admitted to the bar of the state, territory, or District of Columbia and have had at least one year of legal quasi-legal experience. Salary is \$3,163 per year.

Other needs listed by the Veterans Administration included contact representatives, training officers and vocational advisors, hospital attendants, laborers, and laundry helpers. Civil service commission emphasized that training, officers employed in veterans rehabilitation, must have conclusively demonstrated ability in the application of techniques of training and employment of workers.

Full information is available at any first or second-class post office or at any U. S. Employment Service office.
